Methodist District College Rally In Greenwood Today

Bishop Clare Purcell, of Charlotte, will be the principal speaker at a Methodist district rally to be held at Main Street Methodist church in Greenwood this evening.

The meeting, which will bring together workers from the more than 60 Methodist churches throughout the district, is one in a series of eleven district meetings being held in South Carolina in the interest of Methodism's Columbia-Wofford Million Dollar Fund advance.

The Rev. M. B. Patrick, Greenwood district superintendent, will preside at the meeting which begins with
