### What Happens If Electors Disagree?

Washington, Sept. 18.—What would happen if the States Rights group and Progressives should happen to choose equal electoral votes that no presidential candidate gets a majority this fall?

The constitution says that if no candidate gets a majority 298 of the nation's 531 electoral votes, then the house of representatives shall choose from the three candidates having the highest number of votes.

Each state has one vote for president in a house contest. How it will be cast is decided by a majority of the state's delegation.

A candidate must get a majority of the votes of all the delegations—25 out of the 48.

What happens if none of the top three gets a majority in the house before January 20, when the constitution specifies that the president "shall take office"?

The vice president takes over, but if no presidential candidate has won a majority of the electoral vote it's not likely any vice presidential candidate would either.

When no candidate for vice president gets a majority of the electoral vote, the contest is decided by the senate. If the senate has elected, then the winner acts as president until the house chooses one.

What would happen if the two houses of the legislature do not elect either a president or vice president by January 20?

House Permanent Chairman Lewis Deschler says that under public law 199 of the 80th congress the speaker of the house would take over the president's duties in Joseph Martin (R-Mass.) who is running for re-election.

A permanent deadlock—which has never occurred—would leave the speaker as president until the next election.

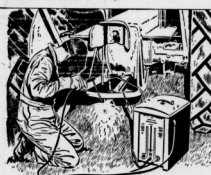
In 1876 a commission created by congressional act voted 8-7-7 to create the contested electoral votes of South Carolina, Florida, Oregon and Louisiana to Benjamin H. Hayes, a Republican. He thus was saved over Samuel J. Tilden, a Democrat.

In the first strictly house vote Thomas Jefferson of Virginia was elected over Aaron Burr of New York. Both were Democrats and in the popular election each won 73 electoral votes. It took the house seven days and 36 ballots to settle on Jefferson. Vermont and Maryland finally swung to him after being evenly divided and passing numerous times.

Burr became vice-president. In 1825 the man with the most electoral votes didn't become president.

And so it was in Tennessee got 99 electoral votes; John Quincy Adams of Massachusetts 84; William
