Services Planned To Subsidize ROTC Students

Orlando, Fla., Oct. 18.—A joint army-navy-air force program to subsidize college students taking ROTC training at a cost of \$100,000,000 yearly was disclosed at the air reserve association convention yesterday.

Brig. Gen. John P. McConnell, chief of the reserve and national guard, said the program will be described in the plan to delegates who opened their two-day national convention here tonight. General McConnell said the program provides for federal payment of all air expenses of college students in ROTC such as tuition and books

with exception of living expenses. In addition students will be paid \$50 monthly during the final two years in college.

In exchange, the youths—estimated 40,000 annually—will be required to sign up for two years regular duty and remain as reservists for an additional four years. The speaker said the plan had been submitted to Secretary for Defense Forrestal "who disagreed on only two points." General McConnell did not elaborate on those two points at the convention, closing sessions. The ARA voted to open its membership to enlisted men who belong to the air force reserve. Previously, membership has been limited to officers.

—Brig. Gen. Charles C. McCarty, Portland, Ore., attorney, was elected ARA president, succeeding Brig. Gen. Robert C. Smith of Dallas, Texas.

62 Vehicles Operated In County To Transport School Children

Columbia, Oct. 19.—(Special to The Chronicle)—A total of 62 school training programs for school bus drivers were endorsed at the National Conference on School Transportation, held recently in West Virginia.

Raych Bickers, head of the division of school administration in the S. C. State Department of Education, presided at the meeting, which was called by the National Education Association's commission on safety education. Among the examples of leniency discussed at the conference was the fact that South Carolina is the only state in which children 14 years of age may legally operate school buses.
