Two tables were daintily appointed for refreshments and pie a la mode with coffee was served before (Continued on page seven)

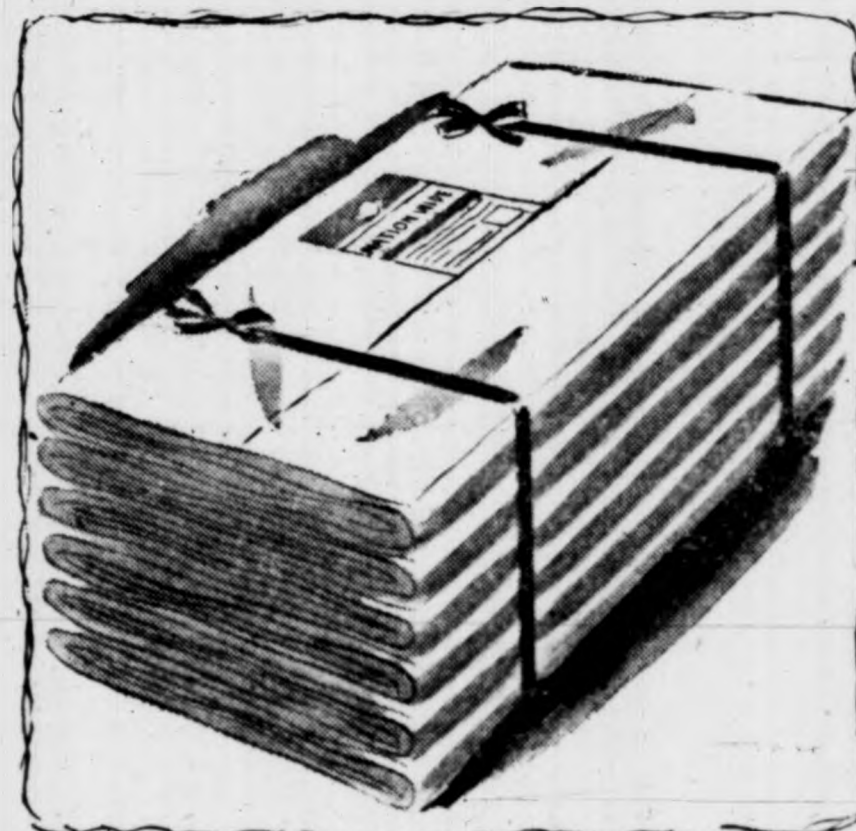
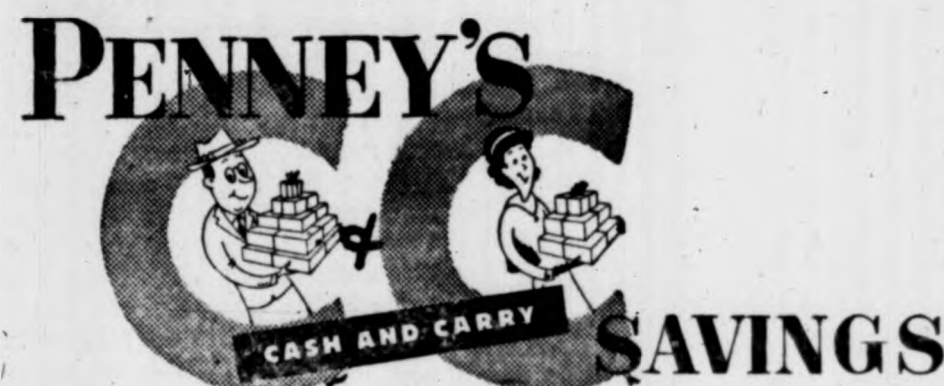
