Bill Would Regulate Insecticides Sales

Columbia, Feb. 1.—(Special to The Chronicle).—The house of representatives committee on agriculture and conservation conducted a hearing last week on a bill introduced by Representatives C. L. Milam of Laurens county, Sol Blatt of Barnwell county, and C. V. Verner of Greenville county, to regulate the sale of insecticides. The committee did not give a report on the bill during the week. Under the bill, the state department of agriculture would license distributors of insecticides and approve or disapprove the products.
