The home demonstration club has been active in the Hopewell community for twenty-two years. During this time much improvement has been made in the homes of the members. For instance Mrs. Dow Bedenbaugh, a member for around 18 years, tell her to a very nice and well built home, however it was not arranged as she wished, so she and Mr. Bedenbaugh decided to do something about it. First the long, wide hall was partitioned off, the front was made into a lovely reception hall, the back into a very convenient and spacious bedroom. Large glass doors were added entering the living room, also to the dining room. The walls were plastered but to cope with other improvements they were gone over and then painted throughout the house in beautiful pastel colors. New cabinets were added to the kitchen, and other modern fixtures for convenience. The back open hallway was enclosed and made into two rooms, a breakfast room and a lovely sun porch. Cement steps replaced the old ones at the front and side, after which the yard was landscaped and planted with beautiful flowers as a memorial to her son.

Mrs. Chas. Workman has been a member for only a short time, nevertheless very active in home demonstration work. Her house was completely renovated. The floor plans of the original were changed which made the house very attractive and convenient. The walls are papered in attractive patterns, while the woodwork was painted an off-white. Since Mrs. Workman is an enthusiastic horticulturist she found the need for a sun porch. This was built on the east side of the house and filled with her lovely prized pot plants. Mr. and Mrs. Workman proved their talents as amateur landscapers by the layout of curved drives and walks interspersed by a variety of shrubs. The remodeling of these homes is only a sample of the extensive work of renovating and landscaping being done in the Wadsworth community.

Home Improvement Aiding Better Home Life
The improvement of our farm homes is definitely an aid to better living. The home demonstration club, with demonstrations once each month

by the county agent, has this as one of its main objects.

Since our main goal is to "maintain the highest ideals of home life," our demonstrations center around some phase of home improvement. We have been learning to budget not only our money, but also our time. This we have done by planning. Planning meals which are wholesome and attractive, as well as economical.

Demonstrations have also been given on floor finishing, lining draperies, landscaping grounds, the family budget, canning and processing foods, and how to buy and care for electrical equipment.

SETTLEMENT IN BAILEY WILL CASE

Agreement Made Between Executors and Two Granddaughters, Attorneys State.

The Bailey will case in which two granddaughters of the late W. J. Bailey were seeking to break his will, is slated for settlement out of court, it was learned yesterday from attorneys in the case.

H. S. Blackwell, for the firm of Blackwell, Sullivan and Wilson, who are among attorneys for the executors of the Bailey estate, said yesterday that "an agreement for a settlement" had been made. An order for the signature of Circuit Judge Steve C. Griffith, of Newberry, has already been drawn up and mailed to him and is expected to be filed in the next few days, he said.

The terms of the agreement were not disclosed.

W. J. Bailey, prominent Clinton banker and manufacturer, died April 11, 1948, leaving an estate appraised at more than two million dollars.

O. L. Long, of counsel for the plaintiffs, could not be reached at his office yesterday for a statement.

Petitioners in an action to break the Bailey will are his two granddaughters, Mrs. Frances Bailey Brooker of Lexington, Va., and Mrs. Florence Bailey Adams of Atlanta, who were bequeathed \$25,000 each in the will. Their mother, Mrs. Marion Fleming Bailey, of Augusta, was bequeathed the sum of \$15,000. The bulk of the estate was left in fee simple to Mr. Bailey's three sisters and two of his nephews, all of this city.

Action to break the will began July 1, 1948, when attorneys filed petitions in behalf of the two granddaughters. Testimony was taken before Judge J. Hewlette Wasson in Laurens in October. In an order in the case handed down February 23 by Judge Wasson he upheld what was alleged to have been the last will and testament of the late Mr. Bailey. After the opinion was handed down Attorney Long and his associates announced they would appeal to higher court.

The settlement made yesterday is expected to bring the suit to a close.
