

RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Banna Chiffon Pie (Makes 1 9-inch pie) 1/4 cup cold water 1 cup mashed bananas 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind 4 tablespoons sugar 2 egg yolks 1/4 cup lemon juice 2 egg whites 4 tablespoons sugar 1 baked 9-inch pie shell Dissolve gelatin in cold water. Place banana, lemon rind, 4 table-

spoons sugar and egg yolks in saucepan. Heat slowly, stirring constantly until thickened. Remove from heat and add gelatin and lemon juice. Stir until blended. Cool. Beat egg whites until stiff, then fold in remaining 4 tablespoons sugar slowly. Fold into banana mixture. Pour into baked pie shell. Chill. Top with whipped cream, if desired.
