Vandenberg Would Clear Pact Aims

Washington—Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg, (R-Mich.) urged today that Congress make it "crystal clear" that the Atlantic pact will not involve this country in Europe's internal affairs.

He told a reporter that the foreign relations committee in approving the treaty should state flatly that:

1. Mutual assistance provisions do not envisage use of American arms to assist Western Europe in putting

down colonial uprisings such as those against the Dutch in Indonesia and against the French in Indo-China.
