\$39,332 Distributed In Welfare Funds Last Month In County

Special to The Chronicle. Columbia, Aug. 29. — A total of \$1,165,986 was spent by the South Carolina Department of Public Welfare during the month of July on old age assistance, aid to the blind, aid to dependent children, and general assistance, according to a report issued this week by Arthur B. Rivers, department director. Of the total amount spent in the state, 71 per cent went for old age assistance, three per cent was expended for aid to the blind, 19 per cent for aid to dependent children, and seven per cent for general assistance. Of the \$1,165,986 expended in the state last month, \$39,332 was expended in Laurens county, of which 82 per cent was used for old age assistance, two per cent for aid to the blind, 11 per cent for aid to dependent children, and five per cent for general assistance. The average award per case for all programs of public assistance last month was \$22.46, on a statewide level. The state average was slightly below the average award per case in Laurens county, which was estimated at \$23.48, according to the report.
