



J. Hewlette Wasson of Laurens, county chairman for Vocational Rehabilitation Services, states that a drive will be made October 13-15 to secure memberships for the organization. The object of the effort is to get the public acquainted with the work of the organization.

Laurens county was ahead in the campaign last year and hopes to make a good showing again this year Mr. Wasson said. In the state last year 1,742 physically handicapped people were trained for service by this non-profit organization. The membership fee will be only for the literature purchased during the year. 


