Mrs. E. D. Easterby Writes Book On Flower Arranging

Laurens—South Carolina garden club members and others interested in flower arranging are reading with much pride a book on floral art written by a Laurens woman.

"The Home Book of Flower Arrangements," by Estelle G. Easterby (Mrs. E. D.) is published by the Shilton Company, Book Division, of Philadelphia.

A national accredited judge, Mrs. Easterby has displayed, lectured and judged flower arrangements in many southern states. Her own arrangements have won many blue ribbons, tri-color and sweepstakes awards in competition and have been featured in Popular Gardening and flower arrangement calendars.

In the foreword to her book, Mrs. Easterby says, "In these busy days of American life, there is not enough time to get young people together long enough to teach them the fundamentals of flower arranging. Therefore, it occurred to me that I might compile a book for them, telling the many things that I have observed and the pitfalls that I have encountered during 12 complete and wondrous years of dedicated participation in this field. . . . In the extensive study of this exciting subject, they will not only have a good time but in their accomplishments will also inspire others to create distinctive arrangements that will decorate and beautify their home, churches and all the places where beauty should reign."

The author has dedicated the 156-page volume to her daughters, Laura (Mrs. J. G. Ferguson), Harriett (Mrs. J. P. Farris) and Estelle, (Mrs. Jack Armstrong).

Among her acknowledgements for assistance in compiling the book are Miss Ruth Riddle, teacher of English at Laurens High School; Mrs. G. N. Foy, secretary and member of the editorial staff of Joanna Cotton Mills; and Mrs. T. A. Cox, Miss Eugenia Burns, and Mrs. William Julien of Laurens, as well as Mills Steele, Ken Eargle, and Carl Julian, photographers.

"For the generous comments on the paper jacket directed to my experience as an arranger I am indebted to Mrs. C. P. Townsend, Mrs. Douglas Featherstone, Mrs. Harrel Wilson, and Mrs. Joseph S. Weller."

The author presents arrangements suitable for various home areas, using flowers, foliage and accessories with emphasis particularly on home-grown material. The volume contains 55 photographs, 12 in full color. An unusual feature of the book is the chapter for juniors, whom the author guides into the fundamentals of flower arranging by the use of nursery rhymes.

Mrs. Easterby has taught school in Virginia, South Carolina and Florida. She is a graduate of Furman University.

At a district meeting of the Garden Clubs of South Carolina March 16 at the Spartanburg country club, Mrs. Easterby has been invited to make arrangements and discuss them and autograph copies of her book. She will also autograph copies of the book at the Vogue Shop in Anderson during a state meeting of the garden clubs in April. The Green Thumb Garden Club of Laurens, of which the author is a member, will also honor her at an autograph party. Plans for this are being made by Mrs. L. G. Balle and Miss Ruth Riddle.
