H. R. WALDRUP

H. R. (Bum) Waldrop, 63, textile overseer and resident of the Crosswell community, Rt. 8, Greenville, died at a local hospital at 5:50 a. m. Sunday after six months declining health and a serious illness of six weeks.

Mr. Waldrop was born in Madison County, N. C., on April 5, 1897, a son of John W. Waldrop and the late Mrs. Ella Smith Waldrop. As a young man, he came to Greenville and for 35 years lived in the Woodside community before moving to the Crosswell community 10 years ago. For 40 years he was overseer of the machine shop at Woodside Mill. He served with the U. S. Army during World War I.

Always keenly interested in athletics, he was a player and umpire with several baseball teams for 25 years.

He was a member of the Crosswell Baptist Church.
