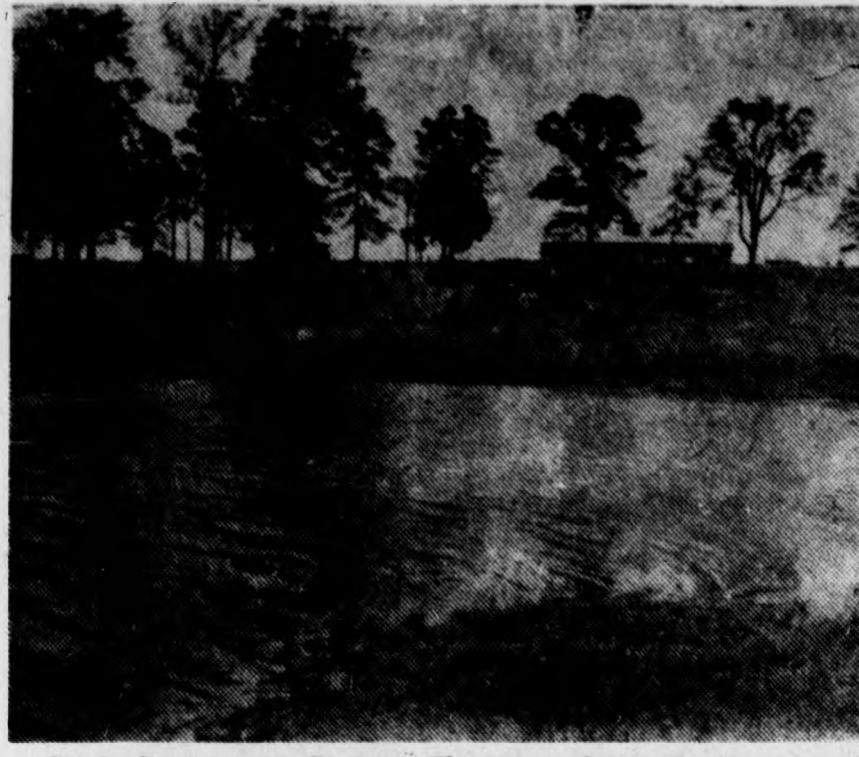
E. A. Whitsel received treatment of Joanna Memorial hospital several days last week.

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## Conservation Notes

Thirty-one new pond owners in Laurens County received 7,950 large mouth bass on Monday for the initial stocking of their ponds. The fish were delivered by the Fish and Wildlife Service and were grown in the Federal Hatchery at Orangeburg.

The ponds stocked vary in size from one-half acre to nine and, were

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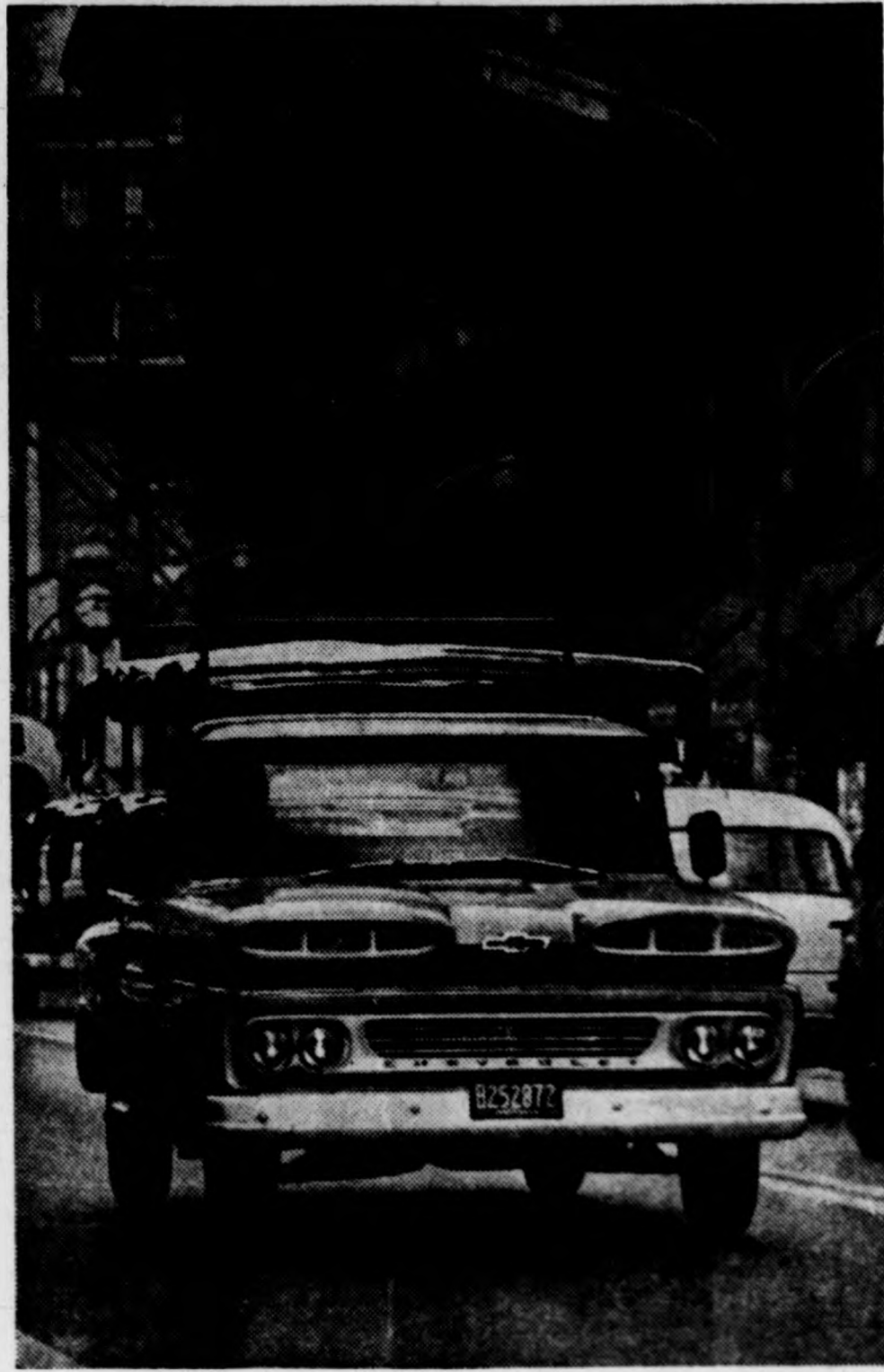
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constructed during the past year by farmers cooperating with the Laurens County Soil Conservation District. In many cases the farmers received cost - sharing payments through the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office in the construction of their ponds for livestock water and irrigation purposes. However, these ponds will also grow fish and furnish food and recreation for the farm families and their friends.

Brooks Stoddard of Owings constructed a livestock watering pond on his farm last week. He was given assistance by the technicians of the Soil Conservation Service in the survey and construction of the pond. While helping Mr. Stoddard with his pond we were admiring a beautiful field of crimson clover in full bloom, which ran down the edge

of the pond. He said, "We have about 75 acres around here. We like it for grazing, soil building and seed production." He pointed to an area where growth was poor and the stand of clover not so good. He said, "The only reason I can give for the difference is that that area did not get any lime last year. When we applied lime to this field the ground was too wet for the spreader to reach that spot. Other than lime

the treatment was the same as the rest of the field." Lime makes the difference.  
G. P. Copeland of Rt. 3, Clinton, recently planted five acres of water disposal areas to sericea lespedeza. In addition, to furnishing a safe means of disposing of surplus water from terraces and rows, these areas will also be used for hay and seed production.
