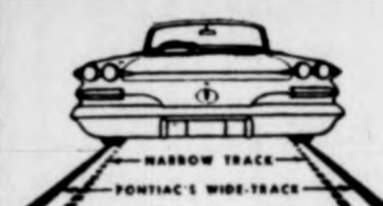
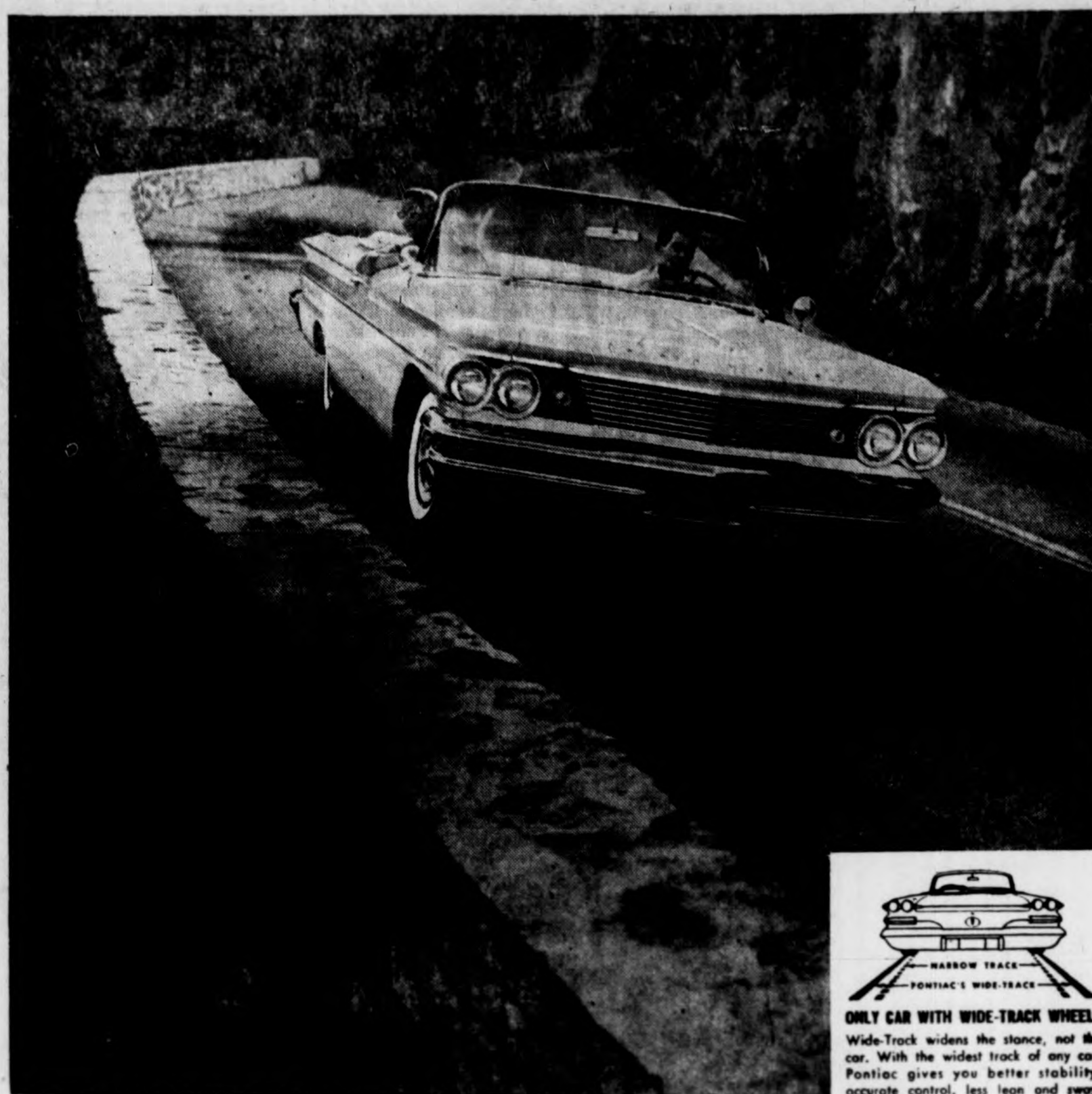
throp. In 1957 Miss Goodwin was honored by the Alumnae Association by receiving its first honor scholar-
