Boyce, Sexton, Floyd To Get Joanna Scholarships

Joanna—College scholarships of \$2,000 each have been awarded to Barbara Jo Boyce, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Elton Boyce, and James Sexton, son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Sexton, both of Joanna, by the Joanna Foundation Educational Scholarship Committee.

Barbara Jo, Miss Future Home-maker of Clinton High School in '57, delegate to Girls' State in '59, member of the Beta Club, and delegate to the SCSA convention in '60, plans to enter Winthrop College in September. James, active in the classical activities of his high school, plans to enter Georgia Tech for the coming school term. Throughout his four years of high school, James has worked on the second or third shifts of the spooler department in the Joanna plant.

The scholarships were awarded on the recommendation of a selection board composed of Dr. Chris Kaufman, president-emeritus of Newberry College, chairman, Dr. K. Nolan Carter, of Presbyterian College, and Frank Logan of Wolford College.

Gene Floyd, son of Mr. and Mrs. Norman Floyd, has been awarded a Special Studies Scholarship of \$1,500 following his graduation from Clemson College. He will pursue his studies at the Institute of Textile Technology in Charlottesville, Va.

In addition to the two scholarships of \$2,000 each, pro-rated at \$500 per year, of which one-fourth is considered a loan, and the Special Studies grant the Joanna Foundation offers educational loans bearing two per cent simple interest to qual-

fied Joanna-connected students. Joanna-connected students include any son or daughter of active or retired employees of Joanna Cotton Mills Company, or the Joanna Foundation. The scholarship grant or the loan funds must be used at a college accredited by the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools.

This is the third year that the Scholarship Committee of the Foundation has made available to students loans and cash scholarships under its new program for aiding worthy students. Prior to the fall of 1956 limited assistance had been rendered through the loan medium. A total of \$18,000, including the three this year, has been allotted to this part of the program. \$4,000 of that amount being considered as an educational loan.

Laurens—Francis Nathaniel Kennedy, 67, died at his home, 235 W. Main St., at 7:00 p. m. Thursday after six years' declining health.

Born in Laurens, he lived his life here and was a son of the late Clarence E. and Mittie (Henderson) Kennedy.

For many years, he, with his late father, C. E. Kennedy, operated Kennedy Mortuary in Laurens. He retired 17 years ago.

Mr. Kennedy attended the public schools of Laurens, was a graduate of Bingham Military School of Moberg, N. C., attended the University of South Carolina, was a graduate of Eastman School of Business Administration at Poughkeepsie, N. Y., and was a graduate of Renouard School of Embalming in New York City.

He was a member of the First Baptist Church of Laurens and for many years served on the board of deacons.

He was a charter member of the Laurens Rotary Club and was a Mason and a member of the Hejaz Temple of the Shrine.
