**Marketing Penalty On 'Excess' Wheat Is Placed At \$1.08**

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced a marketing quota penalty rate of \$1.08 per bushel on "excess" wheat of the 1960 crop, according to Hugh B. Workman, chairman of the Laurens ASC county committee.

As directed by law, the rate of the marketing quota penalty is 45 per cent of the parity price per bushel of wheat as of May 1 of the calendar year in which the crop is harvested. The current parity price from heat is \$2.39 per bushel.

Mr. Workman said wheat growers approved marketing quotas for the 1960 crop of wheat on July 23, 1959. When wheat marketing quotas are in effect, a farmer who does not comply with the wheat acreage allotment established for his farm is subject to a penalty on his farm marketing excess, unless he harvests 15 acres or less or has signed an agreement permitting him to produce up to 30 acres of wheat for feed use on the farm.

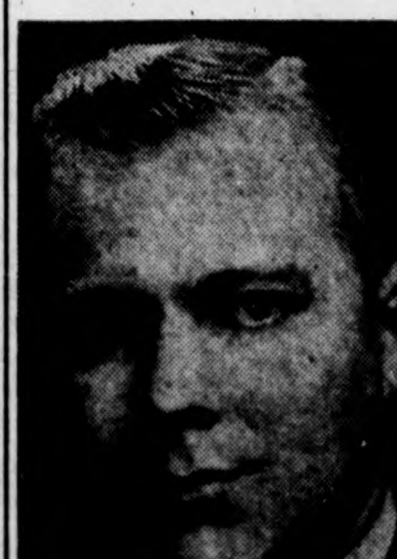
