Council Shelves Move To Institute City Manager

Clinton's city council voted unanimously Monday night to postpone indefinitely the move to adopt the city manager form of government. The matter had been before two previous meetings of council, following a referendum which carried favorably by a relatively small majority vote.

However, since a city primary held on May 31, the results of which were widely regarded as unfavorable to the city manager movement, council on Monday voted to table the matter indefinitely. The vote was unanimous.

The session was the monthly meeting of council, which was presided over by Mayor J. P. Terry, with all councilmen present.

H. L. Eichelberger, executive vice-president of the Chamber of Commerce, heading the industrial committee, appeared to give the council information on activities of his committee. He told of the interest manifested in the city on the part of several industrial companies relative to seeking sites for plants in or near Clinton. Work of his committee is continuing, he stated.

Council agreed to furnish transformers for proposed athletic fields at Clinton High School and Bell Street High School at a cost of \$2,490, with the city to be relieved of a former agreement to install the facilities. School officials, in a letter to council, stated that the work would be let on contract.

The matter of electing a superintendent of utilities for the city was held over until a later date upon unanimous vote of council. He would succeed B. R. Austin, who recently died after a service of 37 years. Council also directed that appropriate resolutions expressing appreciation for the long service of Mr. Austin be prepared and sent to members of his family.

Other action by council included the directive to enlarge the water line to the city abattoir to two inches, instructions to the city attorney to proceed with the collection of delinquent taxes, and the adoption of an ordinance to hold a general election in the city on Tuesday, August 9.

Council also directed the enforcement of the "dog ordinance," requiring the inoculation and tagging of dogs in the city by July 15. Dogs not so inoculated and tagged will be destroyed.

Georgia Firm Gets \$100,401 Contract For Highway Signs

A contract for the erection of a complete system of signs and markers on 36.198 miles of Interstate Route 26 in Laurens and Newberry Counties has been awarded by the State Highway Department to the Tri-State Culvert and Manufacturing Division of the Florida Steel Corporation, Decatur, Fla.

The contract was announced May 27 in a letter of award from Chief Highway Commissioner Claude R. McMillan. It was based on a low bid of \$100,401 submitted when bids for the work were publicly opened in Columbia May 17.

Included in the project are the furnishing, fabrication and erection of a complete system of traffic signs, including delineators and barricades on the main road, frontage roads, interchanges and roads or streets affording immediate access to the main road, on 36.198 miles of Route 26 extending from the intersection of South Carolina Route 773 in Newberry County to the Enoree River northeast of Laurens in Laurens County. The signs to be installed will be made of aluminum, while the posts and other necessary supports will be of steel.

Synodical Training School at College For Presbyterians

The 13th annual Synodical Training School of the Presbyterian Synod of South Carolina will open on the Presbyterian College campus next Monday.

Several hundred women from throughout the state are expected to attend the five-day accredited school designed to train women church leaders. A faculty of outstanding religious leaders will teach a series of courses developed around the general theme, "Understanding the Bible."

Registration is set for 2:00 p. m. Monday at Bailey Hall and will continue through 5:00 p. m. An informal reception will be held that evening, with classes to begin Tuesday morning. Night meetings, starting at 7:30 p. m., will be open to the public. The school will adjourn following lunch on Friday, June 24.

Mrs. J. Melvin Thompson of Olaneta, synodical president, will serve as dean of the school, with Mrs. G. B. Sheppard of Laurens, as director. The faculty members include:

Dr. Joseph Gettys, professor of Bible at Presbyterian College; Dr. C. Newman Faulconer, pastor of the Greenville First Presbyterian Church; Claude H. Pritchard, of the Board of Church Extension; Mrs. James W. Witherspoon of Beckley, W. Va.; Miss Catherine Jameson of Augusta; and Mrs. John L. Fairly of Laurinburg, N. C.

County Conservation Work Unit Staff Wins Commendation

The Soil Conservation Service work unit staff assisting the Laurens Soil Conservation District was presented an award at a statewide meeting of Soil Conservation Service employees at Clemson on June 9.

Employees in this work unit are James B. O'Dell, William H. Fleming, Milton Y. Blakely and William J. Wallace. They received a citation and a cash award for their outstanding planning and accomplishments in reforestation.

They assisted the Laurens Soil Conservation District in obtaining a large amount of machinery with which to carry out this program. With their technical assistance, 9,663 acres were reforested with pines in the 1958-59 and 1959-60 planting seasons.

In addition to the reforestation program, hardwood control has been accomplished on a large number of acres.



Rev. Gordon Peery Begins Ministry At St. John's Lutheran

The Reverend J. Gordon Peery, this week began his ministry as pastor of St. John's Lutheran congregation. Mr. Peery accepted the congregation's call several months ago before receiving his bachelor of divinity degree from the Southern Seminary on May 18. He, along with several of his classmates, was ordained to the gospel ministry by the Lutheran Synod of South Carolina following his graduation.

Reverend Peery is a son of Dr. and Mrs. J. C. Peery, missionaries in India. He was born in Guntur, and high school at Kodakalana, South India. He came to the states in 1953 to enter Newberry College, where he earned his AB degree. His wife is the former Miss Leah Jacobson of St. Petersburg, Fla., and they are living in the parsonage at 100 Cleveland St.

As pastor of St. John's, he succeeds the Reverend L. Allan Wertz, who resigned some months ago to accept a call to the Lutheran church of Petersburg, Va.

Worship services are held each Sunday morning at St. John's at 11 o'clock, preceded by Sunday school at 10:00 a. m.
