

Young Men Must Continue To Register Upon Reaching 18

J. B. Lewis, chairman of Selective Service Local Board 30 for Laurens County, said today that there is a continuing responsibility for young men reaching 18 years of age to register under the Universal Military Training and Service Act. He emphasized that each young man is required to register within five days after reaching his 18th birthday. Those young men who are away from home at that time may go to any local board in the area where they are situated, and register for Selective Service.

SBA Can Assist Small Firms In Expansion

While big business continues to quite often encounter difficulty in obtaining the type and amount of financial assistance he needs on terms designed to fit his particular operation. In recognition of the plight of the nation's small business community, Congress, in 1953, created the Small Business Administration SBA is a federal agency with the responsibility of providing financial and technical assistance to worthy small concerns. Of the four and one-half million business concerns in the nation, 95 per cent of these have been classified as small by SBA. There are 40,800 small business concerns in the state of South Carolina.

According to Howard McKenzie, Columbia Branch Manager, a retail concern is small if its annual sales volume does not exceed \$1,000,000; a wholesale firm with five million dollars, or less, annual receipts is small. A manufacturing concern may have from 250 to 1,000 employees and be classified as small. In addition to sales volume and number of employees, a small business must be independently owned and operated to be eligible for SBA assistance. Mr. McKenzie stated that SBA is not in competition with banks or other private lending institutions and will not grant a loan if the needed funds are available from private lending sources or through utilization of personal resources. SBA loans can be used for construction, expansion, conversion, to increase inventories, for debt payment and working capital. The maximum loan is \$50,000 and the maturities cannot exceed 10 years. The amount of loan and length of maturity are governed by the borrower's needs and ability to repay. While SBA does not make "direct loans," approximately 75 per cent of the loans made by the agency are in participation with banks. SBA can make direct loans only when the funds are not available from private sources on reasonable terms or when bank participation is not available. The minimum bank participation is 10 per cent, the maximum interest rate on SBA funds is 5 1/2 per cent. However, SBA will match the rates charged by a participating institution, provided the rate is not lower than 5 per cent. All loans made by the agency, whether direct or participation, must be adequately secured with tangible collateral. SBA has made over 300 loans in South Carolina.

Coroner's Jury Ends Case Of Man Shot On Entering Home

Laurens—A coroner's jury found Thursday that a 20-year-old Negro intruder was killed by a white man whose house he entered, but recommended that the matter be dropped there.

The jury heard a statement from Calvin Vaughn, 52, of near Gray Court, that he fatally wounded James Wilson Bolding early last Saturday morning, July 30, as the young ex-convict advanced on him in the Vaughn home.

In a statement read to the jury by Sheriff C. W. Wier, Mr. Vaughn told of finding the Negro man in the house some time after midnight as he investigated a noise for the second time.

Armed with a single barreled shotgun, the Dials community resident said he repeatedly asked the Negro who he was and why he was there, but never got an answer.

When the Negro reached for him, the Vaughn statement continued, the white man ran to the bedroom. His wife was with him. Bolding advanced, but tripped over a slight step-up from the living room to the bedroom. "Then I was forced to raise my gun and shoot him," Mr. Vaughn said.

First aiming, at the intruder's chest, Mr. Vaughn said he lowered the barrel, as he fired, in an effort to only wound the would-be burglar. The shotgun charge struck Bolding in the lower abdomen. He was still alive when deputies arrived, but died later at the county hospital here.

Deputy Sheriff W. D. Burns, one of the investigating officers, testified that Bolding had apparently entered the home through a porch window which had been raised about 10 inches. Tracks outside the window matched Bolding's, he said.

Deputy Burns said Bolding escaped from the chaingang in 1957. At that time he was known as Wilson, the deputy said. He lived in the vicinity of Gray Court.

Magistrate Lucile Watts, acting coroner, conducted the inquest at the court house.
