

# Red Devils Sweep Second Victory Over Ware Shoals

Clinton rolled to its second win of the new football season with a 39 to 7 victory over the Hornets of Ware Shoals here on the high school field Friday night.

The entire backfield of Sprouse, Littleton, Stegert, and King, was impressive for Clinton. Littleton raced for three TD's while passing to end Barry Whitman for another. Gary Sprouse accounted for a TD on a 65-yard jaunt in the third period. Keith Stewart also got into the scoring column for the Red Devils with a plunge into the end zone after taking a handoff from quarterback Phil King.

In the forward wall, the Red Devils were led by guards Billy Pitts and Melvin Bailey and tackle Billy Nelson.

Couch Ralph Tedards played his

entire squad and emptied his bench early in the third period to give his reserves game experience.

The touchdown for the Hornets came late in the fourth period on a 65-yard pass play.

Clinton travels to Abbeville this week to meet one of the strongest opponents of the year in the undefeated Panthers, who have been impressive with a 20 to 7 victory over AAA Anderson and a 38 to 7 win over Pendleton last Friday.

A large crowd is expected to follow the Red Devils on the road and be on hand Friday night for the opening kickoff in the Abbeville stadium.

Clinton rolled up 348 yards, 238 by rushing and 110 by passing. Ware Shoals was held to 48 yards rushing, and 126 by passing.

### Dr. Newton B. Jones Edits Writings Of Early S. C. Minister

Dr. Newton B. Jones, of the Presbyterian ministry, has edited selected writings of the Reverend William Tennent, 1740-1777, for the South Carolina Historical Society. They have appeared in the July issue of The South Carolina Historical Magazine and will be continued in the October issue. The writer of these letters was the grandson of the founder of the "Log College," the first school for Presbyterian ministers in the colonies. His father was a trustee of the College of New Jersey, later Princeton. After graduating from the College of New Jersey and holding pastorates in Virginia and Connecticut, William Tennent came to South Carolina in 1772 to serve as the minister of the Independent Church of Charleston.

The material in the July issue of The South Carolina Historical Magazine includes a biographical sketch of Tennent by Dr. Jones, and a love-letter written in 1763 by Tennent to his future wife, Susan Vergereau. Also included are three Tennent letters which were published in the Charleston newspapers in August, 1774. The first is a plea to the ladies of South Carolina to support the embargo on tea by not using any of this "baneful plant." The other two letters deal with the political and religious situation in Massachusetts following the Boston Tea Party. Tennent compares General Gage to a "Turkish Bashaw" because of his arbitrary acts, and points out the danger for all the colonies.

The Charleston minister served in the South Carolina Assembly from 1775 through 1777. The October issue will include a previously unpublished commentary by Tennent on the session of the Assembly of September and October, 1776. This gives an insight into the motives of various members and factions that favored or opposed independence and strong measures for defense.

The last two items to be published concern the incident for which Tennent is most famous, the disestablishment of the Church of England in South Carolina. A petition, drawn up by Tennent and circulated throughout the state, is given in full, as is Tennent's speech in the Assembly on this petition. This famous speech was printed first in 1776 and again in 1815. While it is frequently quoted, it is now available only in a few libraries. Tennent's work culminated in the abolition of a state church by the constitution of 1778.

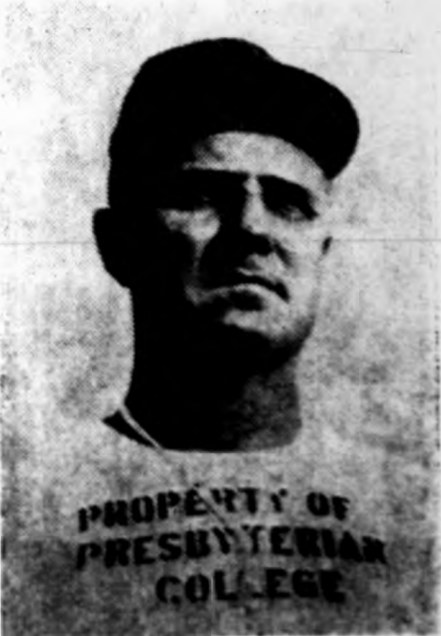
