SGT. HAUFPEAR HELPS OKINAWA TV STATION GET BACK ON AIR

Televiseurs of Okinawa are glued to their screens as usual this week through the courtesy, not to mention the skill, of a quartet of talented noncoms of the four services which make up the engineering crew of the Armed Forces Radio and Television Service facility here.

According to Lt. Donald L. Leach, executive officer, the crucial television signal of the hilltop, "television city" was lost last Thursday due to the failure of two crucial and complex vacuum tubes in the station's visual transmitter. There were a total of seven similar tubes stored in supply which were all found to be, due to rigors of overseas shipment and storage, defective. Some would operate at reduced power, but were not effective enough to carry a full picture.

Directly affected, and caught in the middle, were ETI Richard Breit, USN; S-Sgt. Edward Bordon, USMC, S-Sgt. Gene Haufpear, USAF, and Sp-4 Harold Woolsey, USA. Since the station was already off the air, the four technicians under the technical guidance of Walter Wolfe, chief engineer of the radio-television unit, tried a desperate "long shot" with little hope of success. From an aural transmitter they extracted the "driver cage" which they painstakingly exchanged with a similar element of the visual transmitter.

The long shot paid off, and the crew discovered the strange innovation would function and could drive the visual transmitter.

The station went back on the air after losing two hours over one full day of air time, the longest mishap at AFRTS as yet. The replacement unit ordered tubes on an emergency priority at the time of the tube failure. Had not the professional engineering skill and ingenuity of the quartet of service technicians prevailed in getting the transmitter back on the air, AFRTS' thousands of video fans would have been denied their favorite shows for over one week.


