

### EVERYDAY COUNSELOR

"Teen-Ager Go Home" is the title of an open letter which was quoted by Juvenile Judge Philip B. Gilliam, of Denver, and has since appeared in print. I quote from Now Magazine. The author is not known. "We hear teen-agers complain, 'What can we do? Where can we go?' The answer is: Go home! Hang the storm windows, paint the woodwork. Rake the leaves, mow the lawn. Shovel the walk. Wash the

car. Scrub the floors. Help the minister, rabbi, or priest, the Red Cross, the Salvation Army. Visit the sick and the poor. Study your lessons. And when you're through, if you're not tired, read a book. "Your parents do not owe you entertainment! Your city doesn't owe a recreation center! The world doesn't owe you a living! It is no wonder we are such a restless people! It is high time for us to make some effort to restore the home. We go in debt to buy beautiful hous-

**Palmetto Pathways**

Going somewhere?  
Oh, you say nowhere in particular, but you want to get-away from the house a few hours this week-end.  
Well, there's nothing like a ride across the picturesque countryside in the autumn.  
Escape the tensions of the work day. Get into the family car and make that trip to Fantasyland, South Carolina.  
May we suggest you "kill two birds with one stone" and take a motor trip to a beauty spot we recently visited in the upper reaches of our state.  
First, of course, you must prepare for the trip. Pack some light lunches, if you care, and take along those car coats because you'll want to get out and roam a little closer to the heart of nature. And, of course, be sure the auto is well serviced and there's plenty of fuel.  
Now we're off for a good day's journey—and we underline GOOD. I'm sure you will be glad you made this trip.  
If you are situated in the western part of the state, this may be every-day stuff to you. And, then again, perhaps you have driven to and from work through a country you've never really stopped-to-enjoy.  
Now, who reside in the central or eastern sections, you're in for a real treat.  
But, the time is limited! If you're to get the full impact of nature's painted hillsides, you'd better go soon. We have a few week-ends left before winter's fangs strike—and traveling may become less inviting.  
Our rendezvous with this hardy surmountable natural beauty will be a few miles north of Greenville on Highway 25. Of course, the scenes enroute make this somewhat of an anti-climax.  
Nestled against a backdrop of Blue Ridge mountains is a recently formed lake which serves as a reservoir to Greenville area's watershed. Be cautioned not to tarry long, nor throw trash in the watershed area.  
As you approach the lake, however, there are places along the way where you can stop and eat lunch. There are side roads to explore also.  
And if you are a true venturer, you will drive to the top of the range, where you come to the North Carolina state line. Then return to glimpse South Carolina scenes you may never have realized were there.  
Now, if you want to stretch the trip a little and perhaps plan to remain overnight in a motel in the Greenville area you may cross over to the more western area of the state and visit Caesar's Head.  
Along this route, the trail is more rugged but the grandeur is impressive. There are little mountain streams, peaks jetting high and all that goes into making for you a thrilling exploration.  
Oh yes, you'll not want to forget to capture some of this with your cameras. Color film can best record it all and you can return to your homeland equipped to be the life of a party by showing some of the slides, movies or still pictures.  
It could be a once-in-a-lifetime jaunt for you, so leave the cares behind, practice safety enroute, and yours will be a delightful journey.
