**THREAT TO MUNICIPALITIES**

One of the planks in the Democratic party platform states that the problem of American cities are the responsibility of the federal government. Incorporated in this plank is a proposal that a cabinet rank Secretary of Urban Affairs be named to handle the problems of U. S. cities.

This is a major "liberal" drive, and the nation will hear a great deal more about it in the months and years ahead. The costs of the various federal aid to cities proposals are simply fabulous.

For example, a special Harvard-Massachusetts Institute of Technology study recommends spending \$42 BILLION on cities during the next decade. The Committee for Economic Development (CED) has just published a report entitled "Guiding Metropolitan Growth" that looks to massive federal hand-outs to cities costing hundreds of millions.

The U. S. Conference of Mayors already is discussing how the federal aid pie can be cut. Ignored are the underlying assumptions of the suggested programs. One of these assumptions is that cities, including some of the richest metropolitan areas in the United States, are unable to help themselves. Basic to the programs is the notion that self-reliance is an impossible policy for big urban centers.

These are unwarranted ideas. There is no reason to believe that making a Federal Department of Urban Affairs city hall for all America will result in a cure of urban ills. How can federal bureaucrats in Washington know more about the problems of Charleston, S. C., Nashville, Tenn., Shreveport, La., and other cities than the city fathers of those communities? Obviously, they cannot.

If city fathers have to run to Washington for help to keep their
