PC Closes Good Season With 7-6 Newberry Victory

Presbyterian College wrapped up another successful football season on Thanksgiving afternoon with a 7 to 6 victory over Newberry which gave the Hosemen a stout 6-3 record for the year and their third straight Little Three championship under Coach Frank Jones.

This finish climaxed a remarkable comeback for the PC gridmen. After dropping their first two games, they roared back to take six of the next seven engagements. Jones shared credit for his success with assistant coaches, Clyde Ehrhardt, Vic Spooner, Charles Musselwhite, Billy Tiller, and Mac Copeland.

Except for the lopsided 10 to 27 loss to the Citadel after two open dates, the Blue Hose performed well even in defeat in bowing 12 to 21 to Furman and 0 to 8 to Lenoir Rhyne's top-ranked small college power.

The victories came in this fashion: 21 to 7 over Wofford, 6 to 0 over Davidson, 20 to 0 over Catawba, 27 to 7 over East Carolina, 32 to 6 over Elon, and then the 7 to 6 Bronze Derby triumph over Newberry.

The Blue Hose scored a total of 125 points during the nine games, 32 of them by halfback Jimmy May, and 30 by fullback Bill Felt. They rolled to 2,192 total yards, with Hill once more setting the pace. He plucked for 510 of the 1,377 rushing yards on 111 carries. May added 272 on 84 tries, while halfbacks Ronnie Hampton and Billy Benton had 243 and 223, respectively.

Presbyterian got 815 of its total yardage through the air. Quarterback Bobby Joiner left the way in this department, completing 45 of 84 passes covering 544 yards. His understudy, Art Williams, hit on 8 of 14 for 120 yards.

Defensively, the Blue Hose, headed by such smashing linemen as tackle Billy Ogden, and Jon Vastine, and guard Sonny DuBose, limited the combined opposition to just 82 points, lowest defensive figure of any other South Carolina college.

Presbyterian won its game against Newberry on the extra-point conversion of freshman end Louis Ridinger. The Hosemen scored the first time they got their hands on the ball, moving 71 yards on ten plays, with Hill crashing center for the remaining yard midway of the first quarter.

Newberry scored in the second period after a fumble by PC's May had given the Indians the ball on the Hose 23-yard line. Fullback Richard Seatrunk hit for the touchdown on a two-yard plunge, but the passing attempt at a two-point conversion failed and thereby sealed the fate of the ball game. Two desperate field goal tries by Newberry later in the game also were unsuccessful.

Mrs. Boyette Died In Accidental Fire, Coroner's Jury Rules

Laurens — A coroner's jury found Wednesday, Nov. 23, that Mrs. Lois Hattie Boyette, of Rt. 1, Clinton, came to her death by an accidental fire which also destroyed her home.

The body of a woman, burned beyond recognition but assumed to be the 50-year-old wife of Luther Boyette, was found in the charred ruins of the couple's home which burned shortly after noon on October 29.

Two witnesses told Coroner Marshall Pressley's inquest panel they went to the scene of the blaze and saw no one.

A doctor who examined the remains issued a statement saying there were no signs of foul play evident.

Agent S. F. Wyndham of the South Carolina Law Enforcement Division, said in his opinion Boyette, a Clinton Cotton Mills worker, had nothing to do with the actual burning of the home.

He based his opinion on the results of two lie detector tests, which Sheriff C. W. Wier testified Boyette took in Columbia at his own request.

The jury heard Sheriff Wier and his deputies describe Mrs. Boyette as a woman subject to drinking bouts. Once, they said, she shot up her own home, then went to a nearby Negro home but found no one there.

Afterwards, she went to another Negro house and hid in a barn, officers said. Sheriff Wier described her condition as "mentally off," when deputies found her that time. She had also been drinking, he said. This was on July 15.

Deputy Sheriff H. R. Jones said the charred body was found in the bedroom at the front of the house.

the house. There was a small heater in the room opposite the bedroom.

Boyette changed his story about his whereabouts on the morning of the fire, in his words, so the public would not know what was going on, Sheriff Wier testified.

Deputy Jones quoted Boyette as saying first he had been to Clinton the morning of the fire to obtain dog food. His wife "was raising so much sand that morning," the deputy quoted Boyette, that the husband had retreated to the woods. He denied knowing the house was afire.

Later, the sheriff testified, Boyette told him that on the morning of the fire, things were so bad at the home he grabbed a blanket and went to the woods in his car and slept until about 2:00 p. m.

A Negro witness, J. M. Irby, Sr., said he was working a quarter of a mile from the Boyette home about noon with his two sons and spotted the fire. He drove to the scene, but fearing kerosene cans might explode, chose to leave and report the fire. All they saw outside the house was a black dog, he said.

Another witness, Angus Stewart, of Cross Anchor, testified he was driving along the road, spotted the smoke and got to the scene about 12:30 p. m. The house was in flames and the roof was partly falling in. He saw no one.

A doctor's statement read at the inquest said there were no identifying marks on the body which might be used for positive identification, but it was established that it was a human. No evidence of foul play was found.

The inquest panel was composed of Al Rawl, foreman; Robert Armstrong, Drake Tumblin, W. C. Bailey and Paul Prince.
