

Man Arrested Here Following Shooting Affair In Greenville

George Odes (Butch) Dillard, 21, was released from the Greenville County jail Saturday after bond of \$1,500 was posted for him following his arrest on a state warrant charging him with assault and battery with intent to kill in connection with an automobile chase and shooting incident in Greenville last Sunday morning.

Dillard was arrested at a trailer court in Clinton shortly after noon Friday and was taken to the Greenville County jail.

Mr. McGuinn's wife, Mrs. Kay McGuinn of Tryon, N. C., was wounded by one of several pistol shots fired into the car occupied by Mr. and Mrs. McGuinn early last Sunday morning after they had left a Shriners dance at Memorial Auditorium and had gone to the Toddle House on East Stone Avenue for a late meal.

Mrs. McGuinn was said to be in good condition at Greenville General hospital.

Dillard was located after painstaking police tracing of a Cadillac automobile that led them to a Clinton trailer park, where Dillard was found Friday. The arrest was made by Lt. Vance Patterson of the South Carolina Law Enforcement Division (SLED); W. B. Blakely, assistant chief of the Clinton police department; and Greenville city police C. E. Vaughn, W. L. Jackson, W. R. Berry, and A. C. Robinson.

According to police reports, Mr. and Mrs. McGuinn, Mr. and Mrs. Gary Burns of Greenville, had gone to the Toddle House on East Stone Avenue for a snack after the dance, but finding the place crowded, they left.

Their car was blocked in and Mr. Burns driving the McGuinn car, asked the driver of the Cadillac to move. The man refused. In pulling from the small space, the Cadillac was bumped and as Mr. Burns drove away the car followed.

On Earle Street the Cadillac forced the car to the curb but as Mr. Burns again sped away, the driver of the Cadillac fired three times. One bullet struck Mrs. McGuinn who was sitting in the back seat with her husband.

Dillard, said to have been recently employed in Greenville, came to Clinton last Wednesday and rented a trailer on a lot off South Broad Street.

Seek Laurens Man In Kidnap-Robbery Attempt Monday

Laurens — Laurens County Sheriff C. W. Wier said a search was underway Monday night for Richard Bates, 23, of Laurens, for questioning in the alleged kidnapping of a woman and attempted robbery of a finance company here.

The sheriff and Laurens Police Chief William Power said Mrs. Mona Jacks of near Laurens, an employee of the Consolidated Credit Co. of Laurens, told them that Bates stopped her car about 6:30 p. m. some seven miles outside of Laurens. She was on her way home.

When she refused to get into his car, she said, Bates, a former employee of the loan company, pulled out a pistol and shot out one of the tires on her car and threatened to kill her if she did not accompany him.

The woman told officers they drove to a side street beside the loan office in downtown Laurens. Officers said the woman related Bates told her that when all employees had left the office, he wanted her to open the door, unlock the safe and give him \$2,000.

She said he kept her outside the office until about 8:00 p. m.

Then he apparently became nervous, she related, drove to a Negro section and let her out of the car.

After she was released, Mrs. Jacks said she telephoned the loan company manager and called police.

Police said the woman knew Bates, who two years ago had worked at the loan company for about four months.

Bates is married, police said, and the father of one child.

Mrs. Viola Wilson Hunt died Friday morning at the home of her son Gonzales Harris, of Moncks Corner.

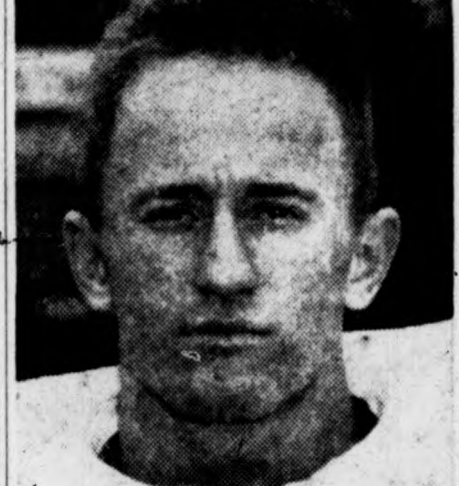
Mrs. Hunt was the daughter of the late Joseph C. and Laura Simpson Wilson. She had lived most of her life near Clinton.

Attorney General Issues Ruling On Chiropractic Practice

Dr. C. J. Hart, of Laurens, president-elect of the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners, has announced that Attorney General Daniel McLeod has ruled that therapeutic devices such as diathermy, ultra-sonic devices, and colonic irrigations are not permitted under the chiropractic act.

In a letter to the members of the board, Dr. McLeod wrote, "Chiropractic is defined to be the science of palpating and adjusting the articulations of the human spinal column by hand only."

Dr. Hart states that the practitioners in this state are happy that Mr. McLeod has issued his ruling banning the use of therapeutic devices such as diathermy, ultra-sonic devices and colonic irrigations under the chiropractic license. "We have long contended that these therapies are not chiropractic procedure and therefore outside the scope of chiropractic practice in this state," said Dr. Hart.
