**EVERYDAY COUNSELOR**

Alcoholism in men is bad. In women it strikes most of us as worse. I suppose it is because women are by nature more dainty and refined. Furthermore, it is more difficult to find a place where they can be treated.  
Friendship House in Winston-Salem is an institution for the care and treatment of women alcoholics. It is one of the finest institutions of its kind I have ever known. Occupying one of Winston-Salem's beautiful old homes, it is operated by Mr. and Mrs. Charles L. James. Both are dedicated Christians. The work at Friendship House is supervised by a 16-member board, consisting of North Carolina's outstanding citizens.  
Religion is the key to their alcoholic rehabilitation program, although it is by no means the only part of it. There is a religious motto in virtually every room and each girl is given a Bible when she enters the home. I've just paid another visit to Friendship House, and as on previous occasions, I found it immaculate. Long ago I learned that a well ordered house or office is conducive to a well ordered life.  
As a result of her work during the past ten years with alcoholic women at Friendship House, Mrs. James makes some interesting observations. She has been surprised how many college graduates and girls with specialized training come to her. One of her girls was a college professor, others were school teachers, beauticians, trained nurses, secretaries. None of the girls were pregnant when they entered, and she has never had one with a venereal disease.  
The majority of these girls come from broken homes. Many of them turned to drink to escape the unhappiness of these broken homes. One thing is common to all—the need for love and understanding. Some of these girls have never experienced it before.  
Her most important observation is that "no person is permanently rehabilitated outside the power of the gospel of Jesus Christ." Some abstain for a period of time by their own will power, and have received much satisfaction from having done so. However, those who have put their trust in the Lord Jesus Christ have experienced regeneration through the new birth and have been able to walk by faith as a new creation, thus winning the victory through Jesus Christ.  
I've had first-hand experience with the work and fruit of this fine institution. Many women have found a new life there. The work is carried on in cooperation with the Chaplain's Department of the Baptist Hospital in Winston-Salem. On entering, a girl is given a physical examination at that hospital. If alcoholism is her only defect, then Mrs. James will accept her.  
Friendship House is the work of faith, depending entirely upon voluntary contributions. I recommend to the readers of this column that you put Friendship House on your list of charities. You can make no better investment. Sit down now, write a check, and mail it to Friendship House.

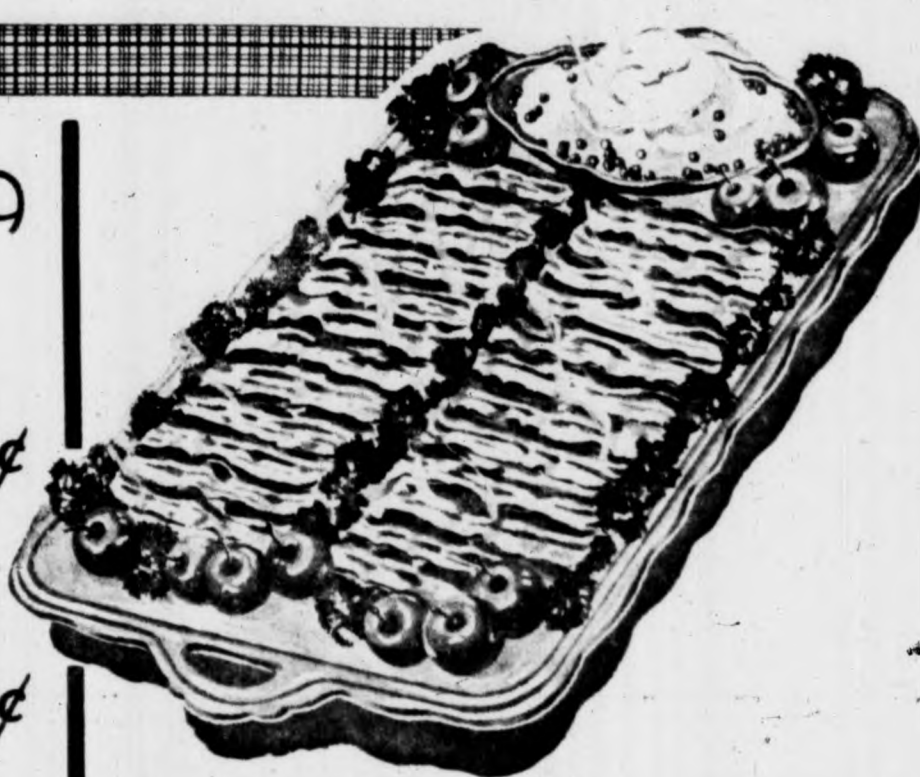
