**PC Basketeers To Appear In Tenn. Tournament**

Presbyterian College basketeers will open their 1960-61 season this Thursday night at the three-day Carson-Newman Tournament in Jefferson City, Tenn.

The Blue Hose, under the direction of Charles Musselwhite, hope to parlay hustle and teamwork in a cage combination that can make amends for last year's dismal 3-won, 17-lost record. It was the worst in history.

Eight lettermen are back, but there are no individual stars on the immediate horizon, since the departure by graduation of forward Bob Stratton. So Coach Musselwhite has concentrated on team play, and his long pre-season practice sessions have produced results. Only game action can determine just how far he has yet to go.

Actually, two sophomores—who earned varsity letters as freshmen—have shone brightest in early workouts. They are forward Joe Harvard of Columbia, and guard Jimmy McGuire of Washington, D. C.

Center Jack Williams of Sumner, holds promise as the biggest

man on the squad, measuring 6 feet, 6 inches tall, and forward Billy Ray Ladd of Junction City, Ky., is an all-round fundamentally sound performer. The leading candidates to pair with McGuire are Paul Ard of Atlanta, and Jimmy Rakestraw, also of Atlanta.

Meanwhile, Musselwhite hopes the two non-lettermen on his team squad will develop fast enough to help. They are football star Bill Hill, now playing his first year of college basketball, and freshman Andrew Karlens of New York City. Both are promising forwards.

Teamates elected Ard and reserve center Ernie Redd of Columbia, both seniors, to serve as co-captains for the coming season.

The Blue Hose are scheduled to make their first home court appearance on December 16 against Troy State Teachers College.

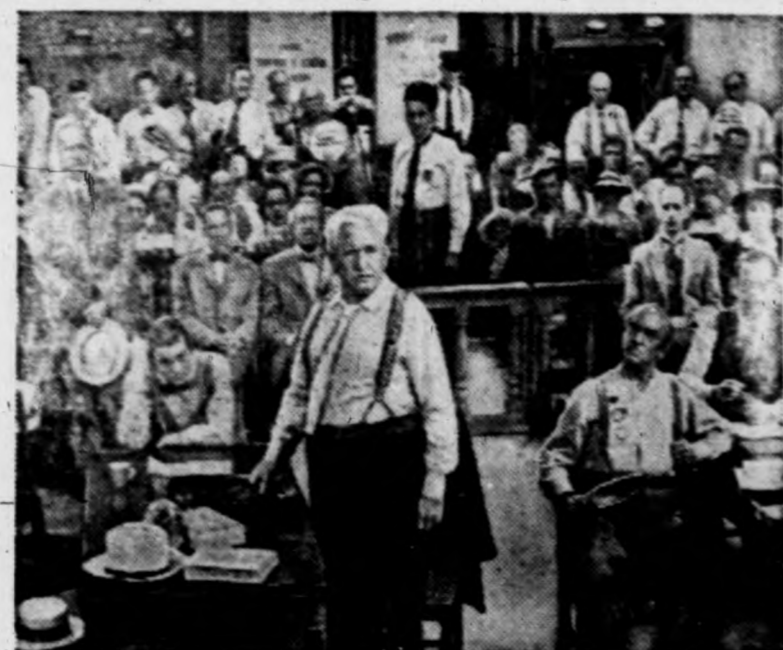
