Selection of the tests a student wanted to take depended on the requirements of the college he plans to attend. Each afternoon test lasted an hour. The maximum number

of tests a student could take was three.

Having taken tests all day each CHS senior returned home with that "done for" feeling. Those students who didn't take the college board exam December 3, may take it later in the year.

Nine From County Invited To Attend Cold War Seminar

Nine Laurens County residents have been invited to take part in the Cold War Seminar of South Carolina January 11-13 at Fort Jackson.

"The purpose of the seminar is to afford a highly selected group of South Carolina community leaders an up to date knowledge of the dangers posed by International Communism to the security of our nation," the invitation states. "You are included in this group accordingly are invited to join with other prominent citizens from throughout our state to receive this briefing and information not generally available to the public."

"We have secured a panel of nationally known experts in this field who will outline the threats and challenge posed by the Communists. After the seminar it is hoped that your influence in your community will serve to bring this situation to the attention of other local citizens."

Invited from Laurens County are: Jack Barkley, Laurens Advertiser; Dr. Marshall Brown, President of Presbyterian College; J. L. Burns, County Superintendent of Education; Gen. Ansel B. Godfrey, Clinton; J. B. Hart, Joanna Mills, Joanna; Allison Lee, Laurens Advertiser; David S. Taylor, VFW, Laurens; R. M. Vance, president Clinton Cotton Mills, Clinton; and Rev. Giles Lewis, Episcopal Church, Laurens.

Those attending will be quartered at Fort Jackson from the evening meal on January 11 through the noon meal January 13. All meals will be at the Fort Jackson Officers Club.

Maj. Gen. Dudley H. Ives, Fort Jackson commanding general, and Gov. Ernest F. Hollings will welcome the participants.

Among the speakers will be: Dr. Frank R. Barnette of the Institute for American Strategy, on "The Threat We Face"; Col. William R. Kintner of the Foreign Policy Research Institute of the University of Pennsylvania, on "Objectives of World Communism"; Chief Inspector William C. Sullivan, Federal Bureau of Investigation, on "Communism, Intelligence and Espionage in the United States."

The film, "Operation Abol-

ition," showing the San Francisco riots before the House Un-American Activities Committee, will be shown. Lt. Gen. Paul L. Freeman, Deputy Commanding General, Continental Army Command, will be banquet speaker on "U. S. Military Capabilities."

A panel discussion will bring home what has been heard in the seminar, using the theme, "The Job To Be Done Back Home."
