**Clinton Garden Clubs Announce Spring Flower Show**

The Clinton Council of Garden Clubs will present a spring flower show "Spring Fever" on Wednesday, April 12, from 3 to 6:30 p. m., at Hodges Hall, Broad Street Methodist Church.

This will be a standard flower show conforming to the rules of the National Council of State Clubs as set up in the handbook for flower shows. State accredited judges will be used. The show is not limited to garden club members only, any interested person may enter by contacting the entry chairman, Mrs. Judson Brehmer.

All exhibits must be brought in by 8:30 to 11:30 a. m. on Wednesday, April 12. No exhibit will be accepted after 11:45 a. m. Judging will take place from 1 to 3 p. m. Doors will be open to the public between 3-6:30 p. m. hours. No admission will be charged, however a silver offering will be taken.

Other rules and regulations include:

1. All containers must be marked on the bottom with the owner's name. The committee will not be responsible for loss or damage of property.

2. In arrangement classes only one entry may be made in each class but may exhibit it in all classes.

3. In horticulture classes entries must be grown by the exhibitor and be correctly labeled if possible. Preference in judging will be given specimens correctly labeled as to varieties. In case of potted plants, they must have been in the exhibitor's possession for at least three months before the show.

4. In the horticulture classes, containers must be furnished by the exhibitors. Coca Cola bottles and plain milk bottles only.

5. Decisions by the judges will be final.

6. Advance entries in the artistic division must be made with Mrs. Judson Brehmer, telephone 833-2625, not later than 12 noon, April 10. After entry is made exhibitor must provide exhibit if unable to exhibit.

7. No artificial flowers or foliage may be used in the show.

8. All arrangements must contain some plant material.

9. No candles or cut fruit or cut vegetables will be allowed.

10. Foliage material, accessories, vases and backgrounds may be used in all design classes if desired.

11. Artistic arrangements shall not exceed 30 inches in height, 24 inches in width, 18 inches in depth. The tables on which the exhibits will be made are 30 inches from the
