Gray, who recently completed the eighth grade, has two sisters, Nancy, 17, and Paula, 13.





# Jim Sloan Magna Cum Laude At Harvard

James P. Sloan Jr., of Clinton today received a Bachelor of Arts degree magna cum laude from Harvard University, Cambridge, Massachusetts. To fulfill the requirements for the honors program in the History Department, Sloan wrote a thesis on "NIXON AND THE LIBERALS -- The Response of the Liberal Intellectuals to the Career of Richard M. Nixon, 1946-1962," combining attacks on Nixon and doctrinaire liberalism after World War II. The thesis received high honors.

During the spring term this year Sloan served as teaching assistant at Harvard, lecturing and grading students in Economics 122 (management accounting), under special permission granted by the Economics Department, as that duty is an unusual assignment for an undergraduate. During the same term the student from Clinton wrote a book for which Houghton-Mifflin Company of Boston has purchased an option; publication is pending revision. This first novel, entitled A SMALL WAR, describes a young man's participation in the war and his growing disillusionment with the war and the generation that is making it. The 23-year-old Clinton native is now working on a second novel.

Valedictorian of Clinton High's class of 1961, Sloan interrupted his Harvard studies by volunteering for military service as a paratrooper at the end of first term of his junior year. He served three years, wore the Green Beret of the U.S. Army Special Forces, saw combat duty in the Mekong Delta, South Vietnam, and was awarded the Medal of Honor of the Republic of Vietnam for exceptionally meritorious service there. Returning to Harvard in February, 1967, he consistently made the Dean's List during the remainder of his undergraduate study.

Accepted at the Business Schools of both Harvard and the University of Chicago, Sloan chose to work toward a doctorate in business administration at Harvard on a \$2,500 Harvard scholarship.
