CAMDEN CITY ORDINANCE

An Ordinance to prevent the keeping of pig or hog pens in the City of Camden.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and Aldermen, of the City of Camden, in Council assembled, and by the authority of the same: That, from and after the 15th of September, 1892, it shall be unlawful for any person or persons to keep or allow to be kept any pig or hog pen on their premises within the corporate limits of the City of Camden.

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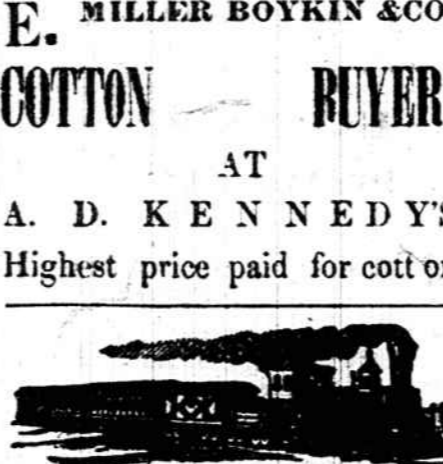

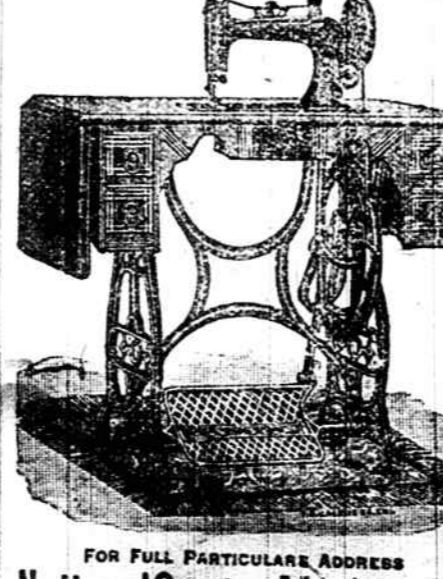

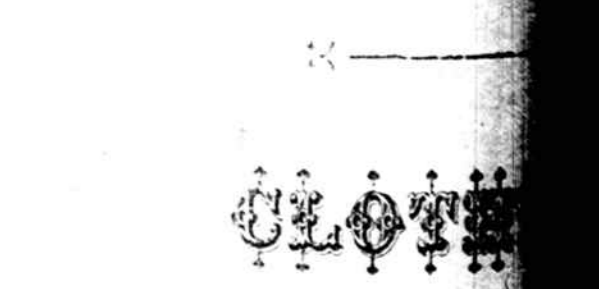
