Notice to Hawkers and Peddlers.

The following are the license fees charged by the county in accordance with the Acts of the General Assembly of South Carolina, as fixed by the Commission for their first meeting held for the year 1895, to be paid to the Clerk of the Court, namely:

- Vendors of Groceries, \$20.00
- " Fruit Trees, 10.00
- " Ranges, 20.00
- " Lighting Rods, 20.00
- Other Vendors, excluding the above, 5.00
- Foot Peddlers, 5.00
- One-Horse Vehicle, 10.00
- Four-Horse Vehicle, 20.00

Special attention is called to Section 1453 of Revised Statutes of South Carolina, which reads as follows: "Every 1453. It shall be the duty of every Trial Justice and every Constable and of the Sheriff and of his regular deputies to, and every citizen may, demand and inspect the license of any hawker or peddler in his or their county, who shall come under the notice of said officers, and to arrest, or cause to be arrested, any hawker or peddler found without a good and valid license, and to bring such hawker or peddler before the nearest Trial Justice to be dealt with according to law."

REGISTRATION NOTICE.

The Books of Registration will be opened in the County Commissioners' office in the Court House, between the hours of 10 a. m. and 2 p. m., as the law directs, on the first Monday in each month, until the first Monday in July, 1895, when the law requires them closed. This is for the purpose of registering persons who have become of age, or entitled to register since last election; to transfer persons from one township to another, and from one township to another, or from one residence to another. All this must be done before or on the first Monday in July, 1895. Lost certificates may be renewed to within 30 days of the first Monday in each month, and those who become of age between 1st of July and the election, may register at any time before election.

Those who refused or neglected to register before the last election, cannot register until the law is changed. Also in accordance with an Act of the Legislature providing for a constitutional convention the books for the registration of voters will be open on the first Monday in March and kept open for five consecutive days thereafter, between the hours of 10 a. m. and 1 p. m. Sections 4, 6 and 7 of said Act, provide:

Sec. 4. Every male citizen of the United States and of this State, of the age of twenty-one years and laboring under the disabilities imposed in the Constitution of this State, and duly qualified to vote under the existing laws of the State, and duly registered as now required by law, or who, having been entitled to register at the time of the general registration of electors in this State, which took place in the year of our Lord 1882 or at any time subsequent thereto, failed to register before the time as required by law, or who will register as hereinafter provided in such cases, shall be entitled to vote for delegates to said convention.

Sec. 6. That on the first Monday of March, in the year of our Lord 1895, the Supervisor of Registration of each county shall, at the county seat thereof, open his books of registration, and shall hold the same open for ten consecutive calendar days thereafter, between the hours of 10 o'clock in the forenoon and 1 o'clock in the afternoon, and during which time any elector then or herebefore at any time entitled to register as a qualified voter, or who has become a citizen of this State, shall be entitled to register at the county seat, and registration also on the days now fixed by law for registration, and entitled to register as such as hereinafter provided, and any elector having been heretofore duly registered, or having lost his certificate, shall be entitled to have the same transferred or renewed as now provided by law.

Sec. 7. Any elector who shall have been entitled to register at the general registration in the year of our Lord 1882, or at any time since that date, and who failed to register at such time as required by law, and who shall make application under oath, in accordance with a printed form to be prepared by the Attorney General, setting forth in such case the facts, to wit: The full name, age, occupation and residence of the applicant at the time of the said general registration, or at any time thereafter when the said applicant became entitled to register, and the place or places of his residence since the time when he became entitled to register, which affidavit shall be supported by the affidavits of two reputable citizens, who were each of twenty-one years of age on the 1st day of June, 1882, or at any time at the time the said applicant became entitled thereafter to register, or any elector who has become a citizen of this State by moving into the same, according to the Constitution of the State, and who shall make application under oath, stating the time of his moving into the State and his place of residence since living in the State, which application shall be supported by the affidavits of two reputable citizens, who were twenty-one years of age at the time the applicant became a resident of this State; such applicant shall be allowed to register as a voter, and have issued to him a certificate as duly qualified elector in the manner and to the effect provided by law, and be entitled to vote at said election for delegates to said convention.

Notice To Road Overseers.
You will have the hands called out to work the public roads as early as the condition of the roads will permit.
You will require the hands to work as many days (not exceeding three in one week) as it will require to put them in good condition.
You will be required to open the roads the width provided by law, thirty feet for main and twenty feet for roads leading into main roads; to have the drains opened on each side of the road, and have the dirt drawn to middle; to repair all bridges.

The hands will be required to be at work at the usual hour, and remain at work until dismissed by overseer. All hands refusing to work or who neglect to put in the proper amount of work, are to be reported by overseer to a trial justice for prosecution under the law.
The law now requires every able-bodied male between the ages of 16 and 50 to work the roads. There are no exemptions now.

Overseers will appoint proper persons to wage hands and require them to have all property warranted.
The Commissioners will expect the overseers to put all roads and bridges in good condition.
