Stock Arguments of the Goldites Dissected.

One of the stock arguments of the single or gold standard advocates is that by the re-establishment of our old bimetallic system, money would be cheapened, all values unsettled, confidence shaken and business depressed to the verge of panic, and another, that increased facilities for transportation, improved machinery and new discoveries of power and its application has enormously decreased the cost of production and consequently the cost to the consumer of many articles, while the wages of the workman has increased, so that he can now secure more of the comforts and necessities of life with his daily earnings than he could in 1873 or since.

Now, what of truth can we discover in these two propositions? In the first place we want to thoroughly understand what is meant by cheap money which will bring so much of evil and desolation upon the country. Our sound money (2) friends tell us if the government re-establishes the system of free coinage which prevailed prior to 1873, and stamps as ONE DOLLAR what is at present prices about fifty cents worth of silver bullion, our whole monetary fabric (gold excepted) will sink to the level of that fifty cent dollar, the result being that confidence will be destroyed, further reduction of values assured, and the country faced to repudiation or revolution. This, in brief is cheap money according to the goldite idea, but as it is simply a would-be theory, and as all theories should be based on the record and lessons of the past, we can't see how this

cheap money idea can be verified in fact when we take into consideration the relative value (or ratio) of gold and silver for hundreds of years, and the certain further development of the resources of this country, which process of development is yet in its infancy. Any metallic substance that is recognized by the world at large as a money metal, on which our government places its seal and guarantee of value as money of final accounting, will be circulating freely and performing all the functions of money at its face value long after all those "sound money" croakers have passed out of existence.

The second argument of the gold men that increased facilities for transportation, improved machinery, &c., are the prime factors in the decline in prices is not based upon facts when the impression intended to be conveyed is that all this including the alleged increase in the wages of the workmen is due to the beneficence and soundness of our financial system. The increased facilities for transportation is the result of congested capital seeking investment, of speculators seeking new fields in which to exercise their peculiar talents, and of the demand for the good things of life with which our land was teeming. Because of this increase in facilities for transportation, our Railroad commissions were created and armed with powers to prohibit excessive freight rates. Had this action not been taken, we would now have but little upon which to congratulate ourselves in the matter of low freight charges at least.

Improved machinery and the discovery and application of new motive power are merely incidents in the march of progress. Old machinery and old methods became obsolete and it is to competition, the scarcity of money and a contracted credit, and not to the soundness of our financial system, that we may ascribe the starvation prices lately ruling in nearly all lines of trade.

I will now take up the last part of the second argument. Have the wages of the workmen been increased since 1873? They have not. Skilled labor may show a slight increase on the face, but even in this, we have no precedent for the skilled labor of today is of a far higher order than that of twenty years ago. It is folly to say that the average wage-earner is better paid now than then.

In addition to lower wages and higher rents, the work which formerly required three hands to properly execute, can now be readily done with two, and in many instances by one. I will say nothing about the various manufacturing industries working half time, &c. lest the reader will think the picture overdrawn, but I think I have said enough to convince the average man that when the whole truth is wanted on matters of finance, it may be just as well not to go to a gold-money advocate to get it. REGISTRATION NOTICE.

The Books of Registration will be opened in the County Commissioner's office in the Court House, between the hours of 10 a. m. and 2 p. m., as the law directs on the first Monday in each month, until the first Monday in July, 1895, when the law requires them to close. This is for the purpose of registering all persons who have become of age or entitled to register since last election; to transfer persons from one township to another, or from one section to another. All this must be done before or on the first Monday in July, 1895. Lost certificates may be renewed to within 30 days of the election, and those who become of age between 1st of July and the election may register at any time before election. Probate Court Notice.

The Act of the Legislature passed Dec. 24th, 1890, so strict and severe against Executors and Administrators, may be unknown to them, therefore this notice is given. The Act provides, 1st, That they shall make their annual returns in January and February. 2d, If they neglect to make such returns in that time the Judge of Probate "forthwith" shall cite them to do so. 3d, If they neglect to do so, twenty days after notice of the citation they shall be "adjudged in contempt," and the Probate Judge is "required" to attach them for contempt of Court, until such return is made. 4th, Defaulters shall be fined twenty dollars for each and every day during which the default may continue.
