Appointment of Trustees. Section 26 of the new school law provides that the terms of office of all Trustees may in any case shall expire on the 31st day of June in each year. There are as follows: Each County Board of Education, on the first Tuesday of July, 1896, and on the first Tuesday of July every two years thereafter shall appoint for each school district in their County three school Trustees from the qualified voters and taxpayers residing within the district, who shall hold their office for two years and until their successors are appointed and qualified, unless sooner removed by the County Board of Education.
