Surrendered to Sheriff Williams.

On last Monday Charlie Hatfield, who killed Brooks McKenzie, at Lamar, Darlington county, surrendered himself to Sheriff Williams, stating that he feared he would be lynched and asked the Sheriff for protection, whereupon he was placed in jail and the fact promptly wired the Sheriff of Darlington who came up on Tuesday and took him back. Both Hatfield and McKenzie are white. Hatfield claims that the killing was accidental.

A Sumter paper says: "Charlie Hatfield shot and instantly killed Brooks McKenzie last Tuesday night at Alecton in Darlington County about five miles from Bishopville. It seems that the parties had a few words about a dog before the shooting took place, but no one knows for sure if any killing cut between them and it is thought that the shooting was not intentional. Hatfield is awaiting arrest. Both were white men."

He Says One Who is Opposed to The Seat of the New County Being Established at Bishopville.

Mr. Editor:—We wish to say a few words in regard to the location of the new county seat. It is evidently necessary that the seat be established at or near the centre of the county. Lucknow is by long odds nearer the centre than Bishopville and has offered \$2,000 and 61 acres of land. Bishopville has offered \$5,000 in bonds and that is no document whatever for when the time comes for the payments to be made they have not got the money and no way to force it from them, as they are all wrapped up in cotton and consequently the debt will have to be taken up by the county. Lucknow bids what she can and will pay, and the men around here wear men's pants, and are not wrapped up in cotton, or bound down by mortgages, but what they choose to have is their own. We noticed an article in the Register a few days ago in regard to the new county which stated that Mr. Parrott said the petition was signed by all except fifteen of the voters of the township. It ended by saying that Bishopville will be the county seat, but just wait until the elect on is over and Bishopville will see where the county seat will be.
