



About Turnips.

The turnip crop should be a leading one, as a large supply can be seenred from an acre of land. The growing of turnips for winter is during the summer season, but while 167 the grow n / of turnips is dove some-96 what carefully after the ground is 31 ready for the seed, the proper preparation of the ground is not always male. Wee's grow rapidly during 81 80 warm weather, and to protect the turn ps the land should be plowed now, Farrowed, and the weed seeds 17 permitted to spront, using the harrow as often as may be recessary to destroy them. Just before seeding the turnips (usually in July) the land should be worked deep with a cultivator and then harrowed down again as fine as possible. This, will not only cau e fewer weeds to ap pear, but will also increase the crop of turnips both in the yield and quality.-Ex.








