UNITED STATES TO AID CUBA

Unless Spain Does Something to Speedily Improve the Situation.

ENGLAND IS HANDS OFF.

Our Trade With Germany --- The Printing of Postal Cards --- A Reward Double 1.

Officials of the State Department are very reticent about a report in circulaion that definite instructions have been given all of our foreign ambassadors and ministers in Europeau countries to ound and ascertain the attitude of European governments in case the United States should intervene in Cuba. While general denials have been made by some of them, others intimate that the United States is ready to assume the position taken by President Grant in 1874, as shown by the instructions of Secretary Fish to Minister Cushing, although it never appeared that those instructions were entried out, and there is no knowledge of what Spain would do in the premises. It is possible that Minister Woodford will have a different report to make.

It can be stated, on some reliable in formation, that there is no truth in the report that Lord Salisbury has sent an unfavorable answer to a suggestion that the United States should interfere, the fact being that he has not replied at all to the attempt of our ambassador to sound him on the subject and that his attitude gives reason to believe that he will not oppose such action as our in-

erests may make necessarry.

Minister Woodford's instructions are o intimate to Spain that the United States will intervene unless the situation in Cuba specifily improves. These in effect were the instructions which were given Mr. Cushing by Mr. Fish, and it is understood that the attitude of the United States is almost identical with the position taken during General Grant's administration. Then, as now, the good offices had been tendered to Spain to bring about a settlement of the war, "but," said Secretary Fish, "the well-intended proffers of the United States were unwisely rejected

The Secretary reviewed the situation, which presents many similar phases to that which exists now. Secretary Grant said the secretary, regarded independence as the only and necessary solution of the Cuban question. The attitude of the present administration is said to be on the same lines, and it is stated that Minister Woodford will make it clear to the Spanish authorities that our interests will make intervention by the United States imperative, unless something is done speedily by Spain to improve the present situation, disastrons as it is to all our interests.

PINGREE TO THE BANKERS.

He Tells Them We Must Have Btmetalism by International Agree-

The American Bankers' Association opened its annual convention in Detroit, Mich., on the 17th, with delegates present from all parts of the United States.

Governor Pingree welcomed the delogates. Speaking of the currency question, he said the demonstration of silver reduced the available amount of primary money one half. To remedy this state of affairs it is sought to effect an agreement among the nations whereby the unit measure may again be in silver and gold at a certain ratio. He said the use of the gold in the arts would cause a stringency in the money markets. He recommends the taxing of manufactured gold and said he avored more stringent laws to compel corporations to allow honest competi-tion and to prevent the omission of honest obligations.

President Lowry, of the association, congratulated the members on the tri-umph of the gold standard, approved the Indianapolis monetary conference, and said if returning prosperity is not here it is on the way. He made the statement that the association had lost 340 members by the new schedule of

membership dues. On the 18th the star attraction was the great speech of Comptroller Eckels. With a profound knowledge of the his tory and science of finance he sounded a note of warning to the American peo ple, saying the financial system of the United States was a piece of crazy patch work, and that the only hope is in the

gold standard. John W. Faxon, of Chattanooga, Tenn., derided Mr. Bryan's claim that the price of silver controls the price of wheat, and said the recent fall of the one and rise of the other offered con clusive proof of the falsity of the claim. BOMB FOR FAURE.

An Attempt to Assassinate the President of France.

Paris, Aug. 19-(By cable)-The departure of President Faure, of France, on a visit to the Czar of all the Russias, at St. Petersburg, on the 18th, was marked by a scene of the greatest excitement, accompanied by the circula tion of the wildest kind of rumors. After his departure a bomb exploded along the route the president had fol lowed to the station.

Although no damage was done, the most intense excitement prevails. It is rumored that the explosion of the bomb was an attempt to assassinate President Faure, the explosion having been ten minutes later than was inten

The bomb was cylindrical in form the covering being of yellow paper, and was filled with gun powder mixed with long head nails. Experts upon exami nation of the infernal machine say the bomb was a comparatively harmless af

TOWNS NEED THE MONEY.

'Original Packages" Lessen Their Dispensary Quota.

THE FAIRFIELD WHITECAPPERS.

The Coming State Fair-Instructions to Beer Dispensers.-Other Palmetto Doings.

Last week in Columbia during the extra session of the State Board of Control, Mayor Evans, of Newberry, in his talk before the board, struck a very vital and important question as to the "original package" dealers and the dispensaries. The towns are looking after revenue, and they do not want to have what little money comes in through the dispensary still further reduced. To him, and to a great many others, this is a very practical question. As things now run the towns will get very little, if anything, out of the "original pack age" dealers, and by the business drift ing to the "original package" dealers it will not go to the dispensaries, consequently the profits will be minimized and the cities will get less and less. It would be very well if the town authori-ties could legally license the "original package" dealers, as they did the sa-loons in former days. By this plan the direct revenue could no doubt be largely increased, and as a matter of fact a great many of the "original package" houses would no doubt be perfectly wil ling to pay reasonable licenses to keep 'original" competition out of their way. So it will be seen that this is a serious problem, and one which will confront he municipal authorities. In some places it is contended that the municioal share of the profits is a small matter. With a right to impose license it would be much more than at present.

It is contended that the muricipal authorities, under the existing decisions and laws, have no right to license "original packago" stores as anything but places for the sale of general merchandise. The contention is that under the present conditions the "original package" man has to be charged upon a uniform basis with his neighbor, the grocer and clothier. The contention here further is that under the decisions and law no municipal authority can by license or taxation keep an Coriginal package" dealer from opening up his place and selling "original pack-

The question arose as to Bennetts-ville, Rock Hill and Yorkville, where there are no dispensaries, and the saloons are out of date. The argument is made that under the Constitution of the State and the decisions of Judge Simonton no municipality can charge anything but uniform and graduated licenses, and the "original package" houses are not to be licensed under the quinicipal right of giving police pro-tection, but as any other business

would. When the General Assembly meets it s protty safe to say that some way wil be devised to make the 'original pack age" dealers contribute to the munici pal coffers, if they are to be continued,

The State Board of Control having granted several beer privileges in the State has also sent out to the dispensers appointed the following instruc-

1st. Bond of \$3,000, payable to State Board of Control; contract and agreement, properly executed, sent immediately to office in Columbia, S. C. 2d. Beer dispensers will order all committee as illegal. It was called by beer through the office of the State Board of Control at Columbia, S. C. tee at an informal meeting held in giving the names of parties from whom

Ed. Beer dispensers are allowed to sell to customers at prices to be fixed by themsolves, on which they shall pay After consulting with leaders of the to the State Board of Control a royalty of \$1.50 per cask; 35 cents per 1-4 cask; 15 cents per dozen in bottles.

A form for the bond to be given by each has also been issued and sent out to the prospective beer dispensers. The contract and agreement requires beer dispensers not to sell to drunkards or minors and to generally observe the rules and regulations of the dispensary

A special to The State from Ridgeway says 100 men disguised and fully armed raided the Centerville neighborhood in search of Mormon elders on the 17th. They visited a dozen houses occupied by Mormons, but failed to find them. The mob forced open private apartments and intimidated the Mormon's wives, who made a determined resistance. Masks were torn off four of the whitecappers and among them Lewis Sharp was recognized. A respectable citizen. not a Mormon, was covered with a rifle and was forced to lower his weapon in his own house. His wife resisted; a lamp was thrown down and the dwelling endangered. Such conduct is deplored here and the law should be enforced.





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
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
