Office of County Auditor, Kershaw County, Camden, S. C., Nov. 30, '97.

Notice is hereby given that the Auditor's office for receiving State and County ax returns will be open from Junuary 1st. 1898, to March 20th, 1898, (Sundays ex

The dates of the appointments at which time the Auditor or his deputy will visit the usual places in the county for receiving returns are given below: Buffalo (Kirkley's Store) Friday, March

Westville, Saturday, March 12th. Liberty Hill, Tuesday, March 15th. Cureton's Mill, Wednesday, March 16th. Rabon's X Roads, Thursday, March 17th. IMPORTANT.

It is important that taxpayers in makng their returns, be careful to state the hool district-whether new or old-in which they reside at the time of making returns. Also to state if it is the same district as when last return gas made.
WHO SHOULD MAKE RETURNS.

The law requires that all persons owning property or in anywise having charge of such property either as agent, husband quardian, trustee, executor, administrator, &c., return the same under onthy to the Auditor, who requests all persons to be prompt in making their returns and save he 50 per cent penatry, which will te added to the property valuation of all persons who fail to make returns within the time prescribed by law.
HOW AND WHAT TO RETURN

Assessors and taxpayers will enter the irst given name of the taxpayer in full. ilso make a separate return for each par by for the township the property is in and where the taxpayer owns realty to insert the postoffice as their place of residence. and those who only own personal propert o give the party's name who owns the land they live on, and in each and every case to name the No of School District

the property is in.
All personal and real Property owned on he 1st day of January, 1898, must be reurned for taxation; and all changes ransfers of real estate noted.

In order to avoid confusion, parties mak ng returns should state number of acre of land owned at time of making 1-st returns in columns marked "Beal Proper ty." Any real estate acquired or tran-ferred since ast return sound be enter-in columns for that purpose giving namd party or parties from whom bought

All new buildings are all be returned Real Property acquired snew last return | Till: POLL, TAX.

The new Constitution which went in full operation after the 31st of December 1895, provides for a pull tax of One Doll upon all citizens of this State between the ages of Twenty-One and Sixty years, ex cepting Confederate soldiers above the age of Fifty years. Parties making returns for the fiscal year 1898 will bear in mind this Constitutional provision and govern

hemselves accordingly.

All returns must be made on or before he 20th day of February next. I canno ake returns after that date as the other work of this office must go on. Aft reubject to the 50 per cent, penalty

All returns sent by mail must be made

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
