

His suggestion met with such ready and hearty approval that, although not more than half an hour's notice was given that the meeting would be held, the gathering was targe and representative, there being present prominent citizens from seven differout townships of Sumter county.

The meeting was called to order by Mr. Richard I. Manning, who nominated Judge T. B. Frasor as chairman. Mr. L. R. Jonnings, of Bossard's, was elected secretary. Judge Fraser stated in a few brief and pointed remarks the object of the meeting and called for remarks from those present.

Mr. Manning was the first speaker. He spoke briefly in condemnation of the horrible crime committed at Lake City that has disgraced not only that section, but has brought reproach upon the entire State of South Carolina and all her citizens. He said it was the duty of all right-thinking and law abiding men to place upon this crime the seal of their condemnation and severest censure, and offered the following resolutions as the sentiment of Sumter


