What Gov. Ellerbe Says About War.

Gov. Ellerbe on Tuesday last gave the press the following interview:

"War is a very serious matter and should not at any time be undertaken except for special and sufficient reasons. If however, the court of inquiry decides that the Spanish government is responsible for the blowing up of the Main it seems to me that war is inevitable. The tardy act of taking the lives of 256 unsuspecting American seamen while quietly asleep in a friendly port should not be treated lightly by any nation of courage. The conservative policy which has been pursued by the administration is to be much commended."

The governor was asked "if war be declared and you are called upon what do you propose to do?"

"I would order out the State troops immediately."

"How many men could you put out on short notice?"

"I have about 5,000 armed and equipped, who would respond to a man and fight a circular saw to protect the honor of the American flag."

"Who would you put in command?"

"If the troops of my State are put in the field I will take command myself. I have ordered Adjutant General Watts to fully equip every company and direct the captains to recruit their companies to the numbers required."

The Baltimore Sun of March 11th says: "United States Senator 'Ben' R. Tillman of South Carolina, and his Pitchfork with a capital 'P'—attracted a crowd last night which packed Dushane Post hall, Baltimore street, near Postoffice avenue, to the very doors. The Senator was booked to deliver an address upon 'The Political Topics of the Day,' and the democratic committee of 96, under the auspices of which the address was made, had sent out a large number of invitations. During his address he was frequently and loudly applauded."

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Educational Column.

The matter for this column is furnished by County Superintendent of Education L. L. Cooper and all communications intended to his department should be addressed to him at Camden, S. C.

I have finished visiting the schools of No. 3, 4 and 18, this week and found them all in good shape. It is my intention to publish during the Summer a report of all the work done in the office, since I have been Supt. of Education for this County. I think this is due to the people who have entrusted me with the supervision of their schools. I will endeavor to make the report complete by giving full statistics showing the disbursements for all purposes from each school district, and hope that judgment will be suspended until all the records are in. I am willing to meet criticism based upon a knowledge of facts, and to ask no favors where blame is due; but I do object to being misquoted and misrepresented by people who act from base and selfish motives.

The individual school depends, of course, chiefly upon the individual teacher, but the schools of a County depend chiefly upon the efficiency of the Co. Superintendent. He it is who sets the standard for the County. Wherever there is found an efficient Co. Superintendent, a manager of a set of teachers, there are found good teachers and good schools. The foremost counties, educationally, in this State are those counties in which the records show the longest unbroken line of competent county school officers. Our State school system can never rise to such position as to command respect, until the Legislature abolishes the suicidal policy of paying \$500 a year for a man to direct the work of from 75 to 150 teachers scattered over an entire county and to direct the education of from 5,000 to 12,000 children.

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test that system, to secure competent boards, to secure competent teachers, to devote his entire time and energies to his work. Such men can't be kept for \$5.00 a year. That is not saying that no efficient man is laboring for \$500, but it is saying that he is doing so at a sacrifice, and that it is only a question of time when he will leave that field to go where his labor is better paid.—Extract from State Supt's Report.
