An Ordinance

TO PROVIDE FOR THE Muzzling OF DOGS.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Camden, South Carolina, in Council assembled, and by the authority of the same:

Sec. I. That, from May 1 to November 1 of any year, from and after the date hereof, it shall be unlawful for any dog to be at large upon any street, park or open lot in the City of Camden, unless such dog be provided with and wear upon his nose, a substantial wire muzzle.

Sec. II. That any dog, found at large upon any street, park or open lot in the City of Camden within the period named, without a muzzle as herein provided, shall be impounded, and may be redeemed upon the payment by the owner or other person, of the sum of one dollar. Provided, that any dog so impounded shall be killed, if not redeemed within twenty-four hours.
