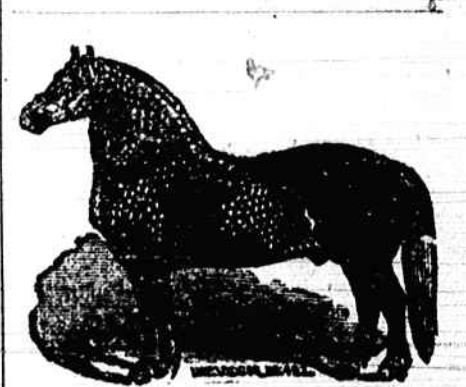

An Ordinance.

City Council Chamber, Camden, S. C., June 22, 1898. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Aldermen of the City of Camden, S. C., and by the authority of the same: Sec. I. Whereas, the Board of Health of the city of Camden have recommended to the City Council the necessity for the vaccination or re-vaccination of all persons who have not been vaccinated successfully since January the first, 1898; the same is hereby approved and adopted. Sec. II. All persons residing within the corporate limits of the City of Camden who cannot furnish the Mayor or City Council with satisfactory proof that they have been successfully vaccinated since January 1st, 1898, or who cannot furnish a certificate from a reputable physician that they should not be vaccinated, shall be vaccinated by a physician between the date of the ratification of this ordinance and June the 30th, 1898, and if said vaccination shall be unsuccessful they shall be re-vaccinated if necessary the second or third time within ten days from the date of their first or second vaccination as herein provided. Sec. III. Any person who shall fail to comply with this ordinance or refuse to allow those over whom he or she may have control to be vaccinated, shall be fined or imprisoned for the violation of any law or power, as herein provided, shall upon conviction thereof be fined in a sum not exceeding Twenty Dollars, or by imprisonment for not more than thirty days, and shall also be required to seek to comply with this ordinance at his or her own expense.
