The Correct Solution.
Mr. Editor:—The following is
the correct solution of the prob-
lem which appeared in The Chroni-

Extra sq. root, 3
18x6=360; (360x(32x38))x12+
3=154 ft.
Rule for the solution of the
above example: To the sum of
the areas of both bases add the
square root of the product, and
multiply this sum by one-third of
the length or altitude.
