She was a servant of Col. Thos. Anerum, father of Capt. W. A. Anerum, and it is said nursed Col. Anerum when he was an infant, and assisted in laying crosses on the first railroad running to Camden. She was said to be 114 years old. She was buried at Antioch.

Report on Foreign Missions. The following report on foreign missions made by Rev. A. T. Jamison to the Santee Association at its recent meeting at Providence, which we take from the minutes of that meeting, will be of interest to many of our readers: "Our Saviour commissioned his followers to win the world unto himself. But it is only here and there that a believer is found who has seriously apprehended the import of that commission. Most of the missionary work done by the Baptists of the South is through the Foreign Mission Board of the Southern Baptist Convention. This agency has headquarters at Richmond, Va. Through this Board, missionary operations are prosecuted in six fields, as follows: China, Japan, Africa, Italy, Brazil and Mexico. Seventy-six missionaries are maintained on these fields, and in addition, one hundred and seventy-two native assistants. The amount expended in support of this great work was about \$125,000 last year. Seven churches in Mexico are self-sustaining. There are also several self-sustaining churches in China. 710 persons were baptized by our missionaries last year. (1897-98.) Seven years ago we had 2377 members on these fields. Since that time, there have been baptized 4122 professed believers, a larger number than the entire membership in 1891. Southern white Baptists, with humiliation be it said, contributed last year only about 8 cents per member to this work. Southern Presbyterians gave about 70 cents per member. Baptists in the Santee Association contributed about 17 cents per member last year. We have about 2500 members. Fifty cents each would yield the sum of \$1200, and this would be an unreasonable sum for us to contribute. We recommend: 1st. That every church in this Association take a collection for Foreign Missions during the month of December next, the second Sunday in the month, where possible. 2d. That every pastor secure an agent in each of his churches to receive and forward subscriptions to the Foreign Mission Journal, published by our Board, monthly, at the low price of 25 cents per copy.
