THE BANKRUPT LAW. Valuable Information as to the Workings of the New Law.

Maj. James F. Hart, a careful and accurate lawyer, has furnished the Yorkville Enquirer with timely and important information as to the siguifikauce and operation of tho new bankrapt law. This article will prove interesting to the public genorally, and aspecially to individuals and firms who are in dobt. Here is what Maj. Hart The bankrupt law, recently en-YAV8: acted by Congress, is now in full effect, and available to all who may seek its benefits. Its provisions seem to be but little understood, as the press generally has not given much attentionto its legal features. The main pur-pose of the lawis to provide the way to close up the business of such persons as are hopelessly insolvent, give their creditors a ratable distribution of the assets in hand, (reserving the State homestead exemptions to the bankrupt, | ardently admired Andrew Arnold, arand then grant absolution for the chitect and also Andrew's adjacent an-When balance of the indebtedness. there has been no dishonesty or fraud, the mode of obtaining the benefit of the act is speedy and inexpensive.

A secondary purpose of the act is to force into bankruptcy, and thereby compel a distribution of the assets of any person who, being insolvent, is misusing or fraudulently applying his means. Insolvency, in the present act, has a new and, more liberal definition than has usually been given it, and no person is to be adjudged insolvent who has sufficient property, at a fair valuation, to pay his debts, exclusive of such property as he may have conveyed away. The effect of the law is the feature that will attract the widest attention. How far it supercodes State insolvent laws, such as assignments for benefit of creditors and releases by such means does not seem to be fully agreed, upon. But as to partnerships, an assignment would be ascribed as an act of bankruptoy, and the assignors forced to setthe their indobtedness under the terms of the bankrupt act, for a most obvious reason.

Under the decisions of our supreme court, all partnership assets are given exclusively to the partnership creditors; and these creditors, if not fully paid then come in ratably with the individ-ual creditors to share the individual assets. The benkrupt law provides, however, a different rule for distribution. and gives partnership assets to partner ship creditors, and individual assets to individual creditors, with the right to each class to participate in any surplus. Individual creditors of a partnership, of course, would not stand by and perunit a distribution under the State as signment law when they can get a better provision under the bankrupt But aside from this, it seems to law. be the better legal opinion that, as under the Federal constitution (Art. 1., sac, 10) "No State shall pass any law impairing the obligation of contracts, but the right to establish "an uniform system of bankruptcy." (Art. 1, Sec. 5) is received for the United States ongress this remedy, when enucted, must supercede and displace all State

So long as Congruss failed to exercise he newer to adopt the "uniform" system for the whole linton, each State exception the right of providing its own vaten of relief for insolvents. But the constitutional system having been provided, the State systems are superreded. This view scenis to be the logreal one and, it correct, the cuactment of the bankrupt law has produced an nnexpected and startling influence on State laws. How to obtain the bonefits of the bankrupt law can better ba ascertained by interested persons consuffing their lawyers. But, briefly stated, proceedings, are commonced by petition to the United States district court, and after this most of the pro-





The fees alowed are so exceedingly small that there will be found difficulty in securigg suitable persons to fill appoint ments of referees and trustees.

The law is full in its directions as to the minor details of the process of bankruptey, and those will not interest the public. But altogether, it prosents a wise, liberal and humane weth od by which the stifled business energy of many who went to the wall under the grinding depression of the last ten years, may be released and given opportunity for new expression in the business world. And in this view, it is not only a blessing to the unfortanate, but a boom to the whole country.
