

An Article of Common Sale for Repleuishing of City Flower Pots.

A sign marked "Potting Soil," s en in a florist's window, was new to one man who saw it, but he learned upon inquiry, as, indeed, he might have re-alized upon a moment's reflection without inquiry, that the thing it stood for is old, very old. Potting soil can be bought of almost any city florist, and it has long been an article of sale in cities, being sold for the replenishing of exhausted earth in the pots of flowers kept in city homes. How often this earth may be renewed depends, of course, on circumstan-

ces. Some plants and flowers exhaust the soil quicker than others do. In some cases the soil may be restored by the use of the proper fertilizers. Sometimes the soil gets sour from too much watering. The soil may last for years without renewal but it might be said in a general way that the soil in the home flower pots, to attain the best results, would equire renewal perhaps once in three veurs.

The city dwellers obviously cannot to out into the street and tear up the done pavement or a section of asphalt to get earth for his flower pots, and it is very likely that he has no yard where he can get it. He may take a trip into the country for it, and be sure to find enjoyment in the going, but, on the other hand, that takes time and costs something, and unless e knows something about soils he may set some that is no good, that is clayv. for instance, or otherwise of little value. So usually he buys potting ow from the florist.

The florist gets suitable earth in the ountry where his country greenouses are. It is pulverized and mixt with various fertilizers, in one proportion and another or with none at il, according to the requirements of the plants for which it is to be used r the degree of forcing to which they re to subjected if they are to be forcd. A supply of such earth he keeps hand also at his greenbouses in in city, and this is the potting soil but is bought by the home cultivators of Howers. Its cost is small.

Commonly sold as it is here, potting soil is a more common article of sale in European cities, where flowers are fore commonly kept than here, and where they are even cheaper than iere. A little potted geranlum plant, for example, may be bought in the streets of London for two or three cents.-New York Sun,

A SPLENDID WORK, Report of Industrial Bureau of th Seaboard Air Line.

Capt. John T. Patrick, chief indusrial agent of the Seaboard Air Line, eports that for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1898, 94 enterprises have been established on the line of the cotton factories, thirteen cauning factories, five clothing factories, nine flouring mills, three-spoke and handle factories, three furniture factories, one broom factory, one rope and twine factory, one shirt factory, one agricultural implement factory, one bicyde, two buggy and wagon and one baking powder factory and forty-six miscellaneous factories.

He further reports that 443 families have settled upon the line during the past year, bringing with them nearly 000,000, and aggregating in number of persons over 2,000; also that there have been set out 224,000 fruit and shade trees at stations on the line

during the past year. Twenty-two experiment farms have been started during the year, and three agricultural libraries, in the ditect interest of farmers, are being maintained through his department, and books from catalogues are being drawn and forwarded to farmers living upon the line on request .-- Wilmington Dispatch.

Philadelphia's Dog Ambulance. The ambulance built especially for dogs and small animals, and the only one of its kind in the world, has been put in use in the veterinary department of the University of Pennsylvania. The exterior of the palace car dog wagon is decorated on each side with a vignette of a grand-looking St. Bernard, and the inside is covered with removable antiseptic pads to guard against contagious diseases. In order to avoid belligerent encounters between the injured four-focted patients of this traveling hospital, it has been provided with movable slides, so that the interior can be divided into various sized compartments. It contains also cages attached to the top and sides for pet bards and poultry.


