# COUNTY GOVERNMENT LAW

Full Test of an Act Which Goes Into Effect Next Year,

NOT IN PUBLISHED STATUTE.

As Governor Efferbe has Kept it in His Desk Drawer Goes Into Effect on the 13th of January, 1899.

At the last session of the General Assembly an Act was passed affecting nearly every county in the State, and which changed the entire method o running the county government, ex cept in such counties where the new not to be found in the statute law. among the Acts passed at the last session of the General Assembly, cause Governor Efferbe put the Act in ais desk drawer and has kept it there. By the operations of the Constitution the Act goes into effect the third day after the opening of the session of the

Assembly in 1899, Section 1. Be it emitted by the deneral Assembly of South Carolina, That the office of county supervisor, as now provided by law, shall continue, and the successors of the present supervisors shall be elected by the people at the next general election, with a term of office for two years, and until their successors shall be elected and qualified, and such supervisors shall receive the pay and execute the bonds as now provided by law, except in the counties of Barnwell, Green ville, Kershaw, Mariboro, Newberry, Orange burg, Chester, Marion and Colleton, when the salaries shall be £600; in the county of Edgefield, where the saiary shall to \$450; in the county of Sumter, where the salary shall be \$500: in the county of Greenwood, where the salary shall be \$700, provided the supervisor shall spend his whole time on the roads and in the county; in the county of Chesterfield. where the salary shall be \$600; and the board shall have no clerk; that in Abbeville the board shall have no clerk; in the courty of Horry, where the salary shall be \$300; in the county of Sabida, where the salary of the sa pervisor shall be \$10), and the two commissioners shall be allowed three dollars pe diem, not to exceed thirty days in any or year, and in the county of Lancaster, wher the salary of the supervisor shall be \$300 per

Section 8. That all Acts and parts of Acts Inconsistent with this Act be, and the same section 9. Provided the provisions of this. Act shall not apply to the counties of Bam-berg, Barnwell Chester, Spartanburg, Fair-
