## Important Astronomical Event.

A total eclipse of the moon was observable in this section on the evening of December 27th from 5 to 10 o'clock p. m., a rare thing. But few of our people remembered the date and did not notice it. The most important astronomical event listed now is a total eclipse of the sun on the 28th of May, 1900, a little over a year off. In this section of the country it will be so dark at noon that the larger stars will be visible.

## No Lee County Says The Supreme Court

The following appeared in last Saturday's Columbia State: "The county of Lee is no longer a geographical division of South Carolina. The State supreme court yesterday finally decided that the act constituting the county was unconstitutional, and the new county ceases to exist." The action of the Court was based upon the ground that the act entitled "An Act to Establish Lee County," approved 19th of Feb., 1898, was passed without constitutional authority.

## The Wilson and Summerton.

The following is taken from the Wilmington Messenger: "Mr. Thomas Wilson, of Salem, S. C. president of the Wilson and Summerton Railroad, was in the city on business yesterday.

President Wilson informs us that his road is to be extended from Sumter to Camden, a distance of thirty-one miles. At present the road runs from Wilson, Clarendon County, S. C., on the Central Railroad of South Carolina, to Sumter, forty-one miles, so that the extension will make the road seventy-two miles in length. It will run through a fine country, and with the relations existing it will give the Atlantic Coast Line an outlet through upper South Carolina and Western North Carolina over the Ohio River and Charleston Railroad, which runs from Camden, S. C., to Marion, N. C.

## Death of Mrs. Sanders.

We clip the following from the Hagood correspondence to the Columbia State on last Sunday:

"Our community was shocked and heartbroken when we received news of the death of Mrs. Eva McLeod Sanders, wife of ex-representative A. E. Sanders. She was one of the most universally loved women in Sumter county; this was attested by the whole community, white and colored turning out to the funeral services to day to show their sympathy and mingle their tears with the bereaved family. Every heart uttered a wail when Minister Copeland closed his remarks with those words: 'and weeping hearts. Kind as she was, all-compassionate, loving, and devoted wife, parental and daughter.'"
