Probate Court Notice.

Office of Judge of Probate, Camden, S. C., Mar. 15, 1899. The Act of the Legislature passed December 24th, 1888, so strict and severe against Executors, Administrators, Guardians and Trustees, may be unknown to them, therefore notice is given. The act provides: 1st. That they shall make their annual returns in January and February. 2nd. If they neglect to make such returns in that time the Judge of Probate "forthwith" shall order them to do so. 3rd. If they neglect to do so twenty days after notice of the citation they shall be "judged in contempt" and the Judge of Probate is "required" to attach them for contempt of Court, until such return is made. 4th. Defenders shall be fined twenty dollars for each and every day during which the default may continue. C. G. Haile, Probate Judge.
