The excellence of Mr. Rostell's impersonation in the roles of Hamlet, Romeo, Othello, Richelieu and Shylock has been commended by the leading critics of all the principal cities in the east and west.

Although one of the youngest of American stars, Edwin Rostell has an unusually extensive repertoire. It has been said of him, that, in the view of the character he portrays, he "triumphs the entire gamut of human passions." Although "Hamlet" is his favorite character, his repertoire does not rest alone upon his masterly interpretation of the melancholy prince and in the dramatic equally opposite characters of "Rich ard" "Othello" "Shylock," "Richelieu," "Romeo" and "King Lear" he has won triumphs equally as pronounced. No two characters known to the stage are more distinctly different than "Hamlet" and "Richelieu," and the rare proof with which Mr. Rostell impresses own individuality in either character is a proof of his remarkable resemblance to a very general desire. Mr. Rostell will present during his coming engagement in this city Shakespeare's always interesting classic plays. Mr. Rostell's impersonations of Hamlet, Othello and Romeo will be peculiarly interesting from the fact that a conductor has no experience upon the man- teau stage and it will afford an opportunity to compare Mr. Rostell's conception with that of other players who essay the roles.
