Railroad Accident. An accident occurred on the S. A. L. railroad yesterday afternoon at which it is said four sections of rails were killed and Mr. W. B. Boyd, formerly of Camden, but now section master at Beaufort, was seriously hurt. A freight box on a side track in some way got loose, going down grade and ran into the crowd without any warning.

An Ordinance To Provide For the Establishment of Meat Markets or Green Grocers Business in the City of Camden, S. C.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and the Council of the City of Camden, S. C., that the following ordinance be and the same be the law of the City of Camden, to be observed and to be enforced by the authority of the same: Section I. That from thirty days before the date of the publication of this ordinance, it shall be lawful for any person, firm or corporation to apply to the Mayor for a license to establish and conduct a Meat Market or Green Grocers Business or establishment in the City of Camden, and the same shall be granted upon compliance with the provisions of this ordinance. Section II. That a Meat Market or Green Grocers Business or establishment as the terms herein used shall be construed to be a place where beef, mutton, goat, kid, and other fresh meats, dressed poultry and all kinds of game, or salt or off-red for sale, and such products and articles as are herein enumerated, shall only be sold, or offered for sale at such place, and always subject to the provisions herein imposed. Section III. That any person, firm or corporation who shall desire to engage in the business provided for in Section I of this ordinance, shall, before engaging in the same, apply to, and obtain from the Clerk of the City of Camden, a certificate of license to conduct said business, which shall be posted at all times in a prominent place in his establishment; that said clerk shall issue such certificate of license, when the payment to him in advance, of the following sum of money for the several periods time stated for each place of business: For the period of one year --- \$40.00 For the period of six months --- \$25.00 For the period of one month --- \$5.00 Section IV. That whenever a license is obtained under this ordinance to conduct the business herein provided for, the same shall be conducted in a neat, clean, well-ventilated and sanitary manner, which shall be kept in this condition at all times and be always subject to the inspection of the Clerk of the market, who shall inspect such places at least once in every twenty-four hours, and such places of business shall be closed in manner to be subject to the rules and regulations of the market, so far as the same are not inconsistent herewith. Section V. That any person, firm or corporation, or the agent, manager or officer of any person, firm or corporation, who shall violate the provisions of this ordinance as contained in Sections III and IV, or fail to allow all meats or other products to be inspected at any time, by the proper authority, or who shall keep in his place of business for sale, or for sale, tainted, diseased, or unwholesome meats or game as enumerated herein, or shall otherwise violate the provisions of this ordinance, shall, upon due conviction thereof, be fined a sum not less than five dollars, nor more than fifty dollars, or be confined in the city guard house, or County Jail, for a term not less than ten days nor more than thirty days, at labor upon the public streets of the city of Camden, in the discretion of the Mayor. Section VI. That the right to conduct said business shall at all times be conditional upon a strict compliance with the provisions of this ordinance, and in the event of any one being convicted of violating the same, his license shall be revoked, in addition to the penalty provided for in Section V herein. Section VII. That all ordinances, or parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith, be and the same are hereby repealed.
